## \* Reflections \* Kerry Shull BLESSING

The closing act of worship is that of blessing. So, what is blessing?

Blessing is an act wherein one party transmits power for life to another (Walter Brueggemann, *Reverberations of Faith: A Theological Handbook of Old Testament Themes*, 2002, pages 18-20). What is transmitted concerns prosperity, wealth, health, longevity, and fertility.

God is Life. Out of love for what God has made, God freely bestows all that makes for life. Hence, we as human beings were not only created, we were also blessed. "God blessed them, and God said to them, 'Be fruitful and multiply, and fill the earth and subdue it; and have dominion over the fish of the sea and over the birds of the air and over every living thing that moves upon the earth," (Genesis 1:28). As those blessed, we are to be a blessing to creation, to be its stewards.

Human beings also mediate God's blessings to others. This ability follows from God's covenant relationship with Israel, "but you shall be for me a priestly kingdom and a holy nation," (Exodus 19:6; see 1 Peter 2:9). There are two theaters in which people, fulfilling a priestly function, bestow blessing.

First, Israel itself is to be a source of blessing to the world. God's blessing flows through the church to the world. This is stated in God's original call of Abraham and Sarah, "I will make of you a great nation, and I will bless you, and make your name great, so that you will be a blessing. I will bless those who bless you, and the one who curses you I will curse; and in you all the families of the earth shall be blessed," (Genesis 12:2-3). This is the basis of Israel's (the church's) ministry to the world. God's people cannot be closed in upon themselves, for we mediate God's blessing.

Second, priests mediate God's power for life. The head of a household exerted such a priestly function when blessing the younger generation. The classic example is Isaac's attempt to bestow blessing upon his eldest son, Esau, but due to the youngest son's chicanery, ends up blessing Jacob instead (Genesis 27). Jacob, in turn, lives to bless his grandsons, the children of Joseph (Genesis 48:8-20).

Those of the priestly clan are given by God a special blessing to pronounce upon Israel, "The LORD bless you and keep you; the LORD make his face to shine upon you, and be gracious to you; the LORD lift up his countenance upon you, and give you peace," (Numbers 6:24-26).

Blessing flows from one with power to one lacking power. This makes a number of very familiar passages in Scripture intriguing. Psalm 103, for instance, is a psalm blessing God! "Bless the LORD, O my

soul, and all that is within me, bless his holy name," (Psalm 103:1). Here, "bless" seems to be synonymous with "praise," or "thanks." We offer such blessing to God before we eat. It is a sign that we acknowledge that life is God's free and abundant gift.

We live in a world of blessing. To approach the world in this way means that we are unique in a society for which "life" is reduced to the things that can be produced and marketed: "what you will eat or what you will drink, our bout your body, what you will wear," (Matthew 6:25). First, the things that make for life are far more extensive than everyday commodities. Life has to do with relationship with God, a relationship initiated by God and bestowed in Christ, a life of love and forgiveness and mercy. Second, life is given as a gift of a loving God. We realize, then, just how dependent we are on God. In worship we open ourselves to God and to God's blessings. Worship is blessing. Worship anticipates the Kingdom when God's blessings will be known in full.

When I reflect upon my association in Ocean View and Frankford Churches, it is the word "blessing" that comes to mind. Especially in a long pastorate, it is the person himself who is revealed over time. The person can no longer hide behind skills and ability to produce certain results. The person, with all his shortcomings, faults and sins become only too evident. You have accepted, supported and encouraged me. You have allowed me to be your pastor and have accepted what gifts I had to offer. God's blessings have flowed to me through these congregations. I am so humbled by this grace, and so grateful for all you have given to me. Thank you.

The churches are entering upon a new future. The challenges facing the church at large are huge. I have been incredibly impressed by the entire leadership of your church. What is even more important is that I know that they realize that we live in a world of blessing. It is a world of needing to trust in God's provision. It is a world of needing to be patient, to wait, to wait expectantly, to wait with deep confidence. The leadership that God will bring will be entirely different from what you have known, but it needs to be different because new challenges must be met.

I close with blessing to these churches.

May the LORD bless you and keep you. May the LORD allow you to hear afresh the voice of Christ. May the LORD strengthen your trust in Christ's leading. May the LORD give you the gifts that allow Christ's blessings to abound in your midst and overflow to those to whom you minister. May the LORD give others a glimpse of the Kingdom in your community. "The grace of the Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God, and the communion of the Holy Spirit be with all of you," (2 Corinthians 13:13). Amen.



Do you know . . . What was the first liquid and food consumed on the moon?

Forty-three years ago two human beings changed history by walking on the surface of the moon. But what happened before Buzz Aldrin and Neil Armstrong exited the Lunar Module is perhaps even more amazing, if only because so few people know about it. I'm talking about the fact that Buzz Aldrin took communion on the surface of the moon. Some months after his return, he wrote about it in *Guideposts* magazine.

The background to the story is that Aldrin was an elder at his Presbyterian Church in Texas during this period in his life and knowing that he would soon be doing something unprecedented in human history, he felt he should mark the occasion somehow. He asked his minister to help him. And so the minister consecrated a communion wafer and a small vial of communion wine. Buzz Aldrin took them with him out of the Earth's orbit and onto the surface of the moon. He and Armstrong had only been on the lunar surface for a few minutes when Aldrin made the following public statement:

"This is the LM pilot. I'd like to take this opportunity to ask every person listening in, whoever and wherever they may be, to pause for a moment and contemplate the events of the past few hours and to give thanks in his or her own way." He then ended radio communication and there, on the silent surface of the moon, 250,000 miles from home, he read a verse from the Gospel of John and he took communion.

Here is <u>his own account</u> of what happened: "In the radio blackout, I opened the little plastic packages which contained the bread and the wine. I poured the wine into the chalice our church had given me. In the one-sixth gravity of the moon, the wine slowly curled and gracefully came up the side of the cup. Then I read the scripture":

'I am the vine, you are the branches. whosoever abides in me will bring forth much fruit ...

#### Apart from me you can do nothing.'

"I had intended to read my communion passage back to earth, but at the last minute [they] had requested <u>that I not do this</u>. NASA was already embroiled in a legal battle with Madelyn Murray O'Hare, the celebrated opponent of religion, over the Apollo 8 crew reading from Genesis while orbiting the moon at Christmas. I agreed reluctantly."

"I ate the tiny Host and swallowed the wine. I gave thanks for the intelligence and spirit that had brought two young pilots to the Sea of Tranquility. It was interesting for me to think the very first liquid ever poured on the moon and the very first food eaten there, were the communion elements."

"And of course, it's interesting to think that some of the first words spoken on the moon were the words of Jesus Christ, who made the Earth and the moon - and who, in the immortal words of Dante, is Himself the "Love that moves the Sun and other stars."


