From the Pastor Gerald Egger

Query: What Have You Learned from Me?

At the next session meeting (Nov. 13), I will receive a review of my performance as your Interim Minister, not just for the current year

but for all three years I have served with you. The congregation is invited to supply confidential feedback, too, through the Clerk of Session.

To aid the feedback process, I'm publishing the unspoken lessons that I have tried to teach the congregation through my actions and general approaches. As your pastor, I have tried to display three core values: Trust, Acceptance, and Openness. Please ponder these questions.

TRUST

- 1. Does leadership involve the **right people** in decision-making? Are decision-makers supplied with the **right resources**?
 - This has been most evident in the three leadership retreats we have held. I have tried supply ideas, then leave implementation to the stakeholders.
- 2. Are ethical standards clear?
 - Ethical decisions may involve choosing the best of several valid options, such as whether to spend money on mission or maintenance. I have tried to promote high expectations without imposing arbitrary rules or permissions.
- 3. Is **group process** as important as substance for groups that meet regularly?

 I have tried to demonstrate Meetings 101, like opening and closing with prayer, making agendas, and keeping minutes, all of which take time and effort but in the end make committee work more productive. The way things get communicated, decided, and implemented in other words, process needs more attention in a membership organization than actual results.
- 4. Are ties to the wider church strong, so as to benefit local mission and ministry?

 An example is the presbytery grant that we applied for and received on behalf of Milford Housing Development Corp.
- 5. Is the atmosphere in the **church office** friendly and informal, but still business-like?

Business-like means return calls promptly, produce accurate records of contributions, provide adequate notice of meetings and deadlines, notify all stakeholders of administrative changes, keep the website current.

- 6. Do we treat every **asset** the church owns as a legacy from the past held in trust for the future?

 The core of Biblical stewardship is that all wealth is held in temporary trust from God. Tithing is the Biblical standard of stewardship, for individuals and churches.
- 7. Is there **transparency** in financial matters?

 Session sees financial data monthly, the congregation annually. Too much financial data, however, obscures rather than illuminates what is important.
- 8. Is **confidentiality** maintained, and excessive secrecy discouraged?

A small congregation affords little anonymity.
Therefore confidentiality must be preserved. At the same time, routine secrecy erodes trust.

ACCEPTANCE

- 1. Are even seasoned church-folk hearing something new in a sermon?
 - When I prepare a sermon I try to answer the question I most want to ask of the scripture.
- 2. Are **sacraments** and welcoming rituals (such as for new members) tapping into ancient legacies for meaning in today's living?
 - I believe that recurring ceremonies need a balance of familiar and unfamiliar language, to keep them fresh while affirming what has worked for the church over time.
- 3. Is **hospitality** been a side-benefit of corporate worship? More than the hymns and liturgies, more than the sermon and pastoral prayers, a consistent take-away from worship is the sense of being in the right place.
- 4. Are individual differences celebrated as gifts of God? Some differences sort out along conservative-to-progressive lines, others around old-versus-new. This congregation is fairly homogenous in age, which can be off-putting to younger guests. The important differences in congregational life are theological, of

- differences in congregational life are theological, of which there is a wide range in this congregation.
- 5. Have occasional **disagreements** become stepping stones to deeper community? A norm of acceptance fosters "what do you think about this?" dialogue.

OPENNESS

- 1. Is study of the **Bible** as much about heart as mind?

 Biblical truth is independent of a literal interpretation of scripture. Another way to say this is that the Bible becomes the living word of God when it is spoken and heard in community. Openness to new truths is what makes Bible study meaningful.
- 2. Has the congregation become more of a **learning community**? Does it have porous boundaries that do not depend on formal lines of authority.
- We are ministers to one another. Anyone can teach, everyone can learn.

 3. Are worship services open to the movement of the spirit?
 - In the Reformed tradition, God is both intimate and immanent. That is, God is involved in the intimate details of peoples' lives their decisions, feelings, preferences, and behaviors. And God is involved in the big-picture of creation history as it unfolds. Even informal or abbreviated services of worship can capture the both-and of God's presence.

In conclusion:

While I am positioning these as queries about the pastor, they are questions for everyone to ask themselves as members and friends of this congregation; indeed, as citizens of God's kingdom.

If I have taught as I set out to do, you will have learned these values as self-reinforcing: Trust builds acceptance, acceptance builds openness; and openness builds trust.



Presbytery News Mike Read

The 837th Stated Meeting of New Castle Presbytery (NCP) was held on Tuesday, September 19, 2017, at First Presbyterian Church in Newark, Delaware. Reverend Edwin Estevez led the group in worship. Offerings from the worship service were donated toward the support of the Newark Empowerment Center, a ministry of Friendship House.


The meeting included the election of a number of officers and representatives, including the election of the slate of nominees to serve on the IGNITE team, presented by the Committee on Nominations at the 836th Stated Meeting in May, and charged with managing the financial resources of NCP, as prescribed under the provisions of the Balcony 2 restructuring approved in the 835th Stated Meeting in March. The slate included representatives of the Speer Trust Commission, West Legacy Trust, Church Development Unit, and Mission Develop Unit, as well as representatives at-large.

The 2018 budget was passed, which, after operating expenses, will provide approximately \$761,000 for the IGNITE Team to use for mission projects.

The budget also provides for a 2018 per-capita assessment of \$29.00 per member throughout New Castle Presbytery, which represents a reduction of \$2.67 per member from the current amount.

New Business proceedings included passage of a motion on behalf of the Guatemala Partnership Committee and a motion on behalf of the Matthew Action Committee, regarding resolutions to the immigration crisis.
