Expectations Realized

As we enter my last three months of transitional ministry with Ocean View Presbyterian, I want us to reflect on what has been realized of our initial expectations, as laid out in the newsletter of October 2014. We have much to be

pleased with. Here are the Expectations, as published in the OVPC Newsletter of October 2014, and our Realizations together over the course of three years.

Expectation, October 2014

"My expectation is that our work together will take more than one year but less than two, but that is just a guess. When the church is ready to call an installed pastor, my connection will diminish, then cease altogether. So in this regard, embarking on the interim period together is the start of a long goodbye to me and Marge."

Realization 2017

My guess as to length of the transition was off. It took about 18 months to get the church ready to search for an installed pastor. Much of this time was spent improving administrative and financial effectiveness. One small example is the weekly worship bulletin, which is now so routine that we have most of it ready by the Monday before. Another indicator is that when we brought on a new office secretary in March of 2017, she mastered the job in a month's time (and not just because Linda is quite competent).

Expectation, October 2014

"There is a big blue sky for new ideas and plans, unencumbered by the past. Thoughts and feelings about the church, even negative thoughts and feelings, can be shared without jeopardy to long-term relationships. Conscious awareness of 'how much time this is taking' can spur decisions and active participation."

Realization 2017

In 2014 the church budgeted \$156,500 for capital and operating expenses; the year ended with a small surplus but it wasn't enough to avert a cash crunch in early 2015. Two years later, in 2016, the church squeezed the budget down to \$151,400 and broke even, thanks to a \$10,000 increase in income over 2014. In the current budget year at the mid-point, income was running ahead of projection and expenses were running below - plenty of blue sky in that picture.

Yes, we have experienced times of impatience over the transitional process, more impatience I think in the months before the Pastor Nominating Committee was formed than in the 18 months since. As I recall our

three years together, it's been a time of tilling and enriching the rich soil left from a long and successful previous pastorate, getting it ready for new harvests.

Expectation, October 2014

"There are five over-arching tasks that we will accomplish together during the interim period."

Realization 2017

Our five large transitional tasks were largely completed by the time the Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC) posted the Ministry Information Form in May 2016, publicly starting the pastoral search.

Expectation, October 2014

"The first task is to come to terms with the church's history. The period between installed pastors is an ideal time to assess OVPC's role in the history of the Ocean View community."

Realization 2017

The history of Frankford Presbyterian Church's relationship with Ocean View was changed before I officially started as transitional minister, a courageous separation that has not harmed either congregation and, I think, cleared the field for OVPC to grow in mission.

We have freshened up our rolls. Half of the current membership has joined since 2006; we have received 22 new members since November 2014. I think our institutional memory is as strong as it needs to be.

Expectation October 2014

"The second great task is to put into words the church's current identity. As part of this task, Session will undertake a study to uncover missional opportunities."

Realization 2017

The Mission Study published in March 2016 presents a complete picture of OVPC today, including its place in the surrounding community. I am particularly pleased with the Narrative Budget first published in the Mission Study and updated for the 2017 annual meeting.

How a church spends its money is a good indicator of church health. The Narrative Budget paints a picture of OVPC doing God's work in four spheres: 44% of our cash supports worshiping; 23% supports growing in discipleship; 11% supports caring and communicating; and 22% supports reaching out in service and mission. That's a Christ-like vision, in my opinion.

Our Mission Matrix, a product of the Leadership Retreat in 2014, provides historical detail around "reaching out." Not only does OVPC budget over \$36,000 annually to benevolence, but members and friends donate another \$30,000 to specific mission appeals month by month. Hands-on service projects, such as works for the Milford Housing Development Corp. and the annual Nativity Festival, involve the wider community.

Expectation, October 2014

The third task concerns congregational leadership. In any vital congregation like OVPC, leaders get burned out and need a break. As new people come to church events for the first time, out of curiosity, they should get the impression that there is room for

curiosity, they should get the impression that there is room for them to contribute time and talents.

Realization 2017

An indicator of people's commitment to the church is the annual officer nominating process. For the second year in a row, the nominating committee is enjoying an abundance of candidates for open positions.

The leadership profile of OVPC compiled in 2015 explains in part how the congregation sustains its programs and services at such a high level. Among our elders, deacons, and committee chairs we are blessed with communicators, greeters, planners, risk managers, teachers, fund raisers, and coordinators. (On the wish-list are financial managers, media and technology experts, publicists, and strategic leaders.)

Expectation, October 2014

"The fourth transitional task, one at which Ocean View Presbyterian already excels, is maintaining ties with the denomination, PCUSA. Eventually, the congregation will elect a Pastor Nominating Committee, which will be assisted by a liaison with the Committee on Ministry in the evaluation of pastor candidates."

Realization 2017

The congregation elected a 5-person Pastor Nominating Committee in February 2016, which has met faithfully for the past 18 months to review candidates, greatly assisted by their presbytery liaison from the Committee on Ministry.

When I have attended the denomination's Big Tent conferences (2015, 2017), I have been pleased to recognize how our little church on Delmarva is contributing to the initiatives and thrusts of the larger church. An example is "We Choose Welcome," an initiative to support refugee settlement.

OVPC makes a strong impact in New Castle Presbytery. It is not unusual to have five elders and pastors at a presbytery meeting. Several members as well as the pastor and a retired pastor serve on year-round presbytery committees. Our Sewing Circle has maintained its historic commitment to Presbyterian Women's goals and education.

Expectation, October 2014

"Once the Pastor Nominating Committee has begun work, the congregation will be into the transitional task of committing to new ministries. The fifth great task of the transition is to bring all the inputs into harmony. Many needs will have been uncovered."

Realization 2017

Groups and committees are coming up with new missions and ministries all the time. It's the growing edge of the congregation. The success of Sewing Circle's "Water 4" project is one example. A spirit of social justice and benevolence is nurtured by a strong Christian Education program, including TED talks and book discussions. Quite a few members are planning an educational trip together to our mission partner in Costa Rica.

I look forward to our remaining months together. We will celebrate our successes as we anticipate God's sending us an installed pastor who will take OVPC to the next level. It has been my joy and pleasure to serve as your transitional minister.

The Session of OVPC met on Monday, September 11, 2017 at the home of Elsie Young.

Approved MOTION to accept the minutes of the August 14, 2017 Session Meeting with a change.

Approved MOTION to accept the Treasurer's Report for August 2017.

The Church Nominating Committee is meeting to fill the vacancies on our boards and committees. When asked to serve, please prayerfully consider serving the OVPC congregation in a leadership role.

Approved MOTION to elect Mike Quinn the 2018 OVPC Presbytery Commissioner.

Approved Worship Committee **MOTION** to receive the revised "Policy on Christian Marriage' with changes.

Book Discussion, Waking Up White

October 1 and continuing through November 19

In small groups, we will have an opportunity to share reactions as Presbyterians to the thought-provoking book, Waking Up White.

The author, Debby Irving, grew up in a predominantly white, upper middle class community in Massachusetts. For much of her life, she didn't give much thought to race, even though she had encountered racial tensions at work and her children's schools. When she was in her 40s, after taking a graduate school course in "Race and Cultural Identity," Irving began to comprehend how much she had benefited over the years because she was white.

Irving writes about her discoveries and how she began to question her long held assumptions about race and culture in her 2014 book, *Waking up White, and Finding Myself in the Story of Race*. The co-moderators of the 2016 General Assembly are urging all Presbyterians to study Irving's story as a way of discovering our attitudes toward race hidden even from ourselves.

The 250-page book is available in stores and on Amazon.com for about \$17.
