## ✧ Reflections ✧

Today, with horrific images of starvation flowing from Somalia, war in Libya, government crackdown on protests in Syria, continuing violence in Iraq, and war in Afghanistan, we witness power—intended by God to be used to shepherd people, to care for people—being used instead to benefit a few at the expense of others (see Ezekiel 34:1-31).

The church has been given a symbol that exposes and challenges this one-sided abuse of power. We have been given a symbol that envisions a world turned up side down, a world in which people are valued, receive care, and are afforded opportunity. Here the outcasts and forgotten have a home. That symbol is the Supper.

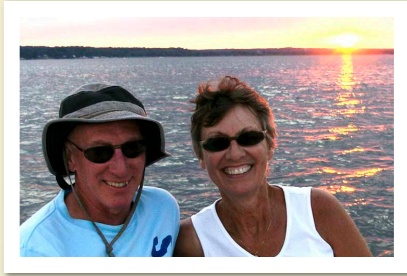
The power of the Supper comes from its roots in the Hebrew Scriptures. The Supper arises from the abundance of the Garden (Genesis 2:4b-25); an image that is such a stark contrast to the scarcity so many today endure. The Supper arises from God's act of redeeming the Hebrew people from slavery in Egypt and leading them into a land of promise. In the wilderness, they were alone with God and utterly dependent upon God's provision. God did provide: manna from heaven (Exodus 16:1-36) and water from the rock (Exodus 17:1-7). By that heavenly food, not only were the Hebrews fed, but learned that they could entrust their lives to God's loving care. The Supper arises out of the hope given by God to a people in Exile: "Ho, everyone who thirsts, come to the waters; and you that have no money, come, buy and eat! Come, buy wine and milk without money and without price. Why do you spend your money for that which is not bread, and your labor for that which does not satisfy? Listen carefully to me, and eat what is good, and delight yourselves in rich food. Incline your ear, and come to me; listen, so that you may live," (Isaiah 55:1-3a). This is a promised abundance that looks beyond any return from Exile and anticipates the Kingdom God. This is a Kingdom Jesus heralded as he—seeing the need of the crowd who left all to come to hear him and to be healed by him—fed them wondrously with five loaves and two fish (Matthew 14:13-21). The Supper arises from a final meal Jesus had with his disciples in which he said that what he was feeding them was, not mere bread and wine, but his own life that he was about to offer up on the cross (Matthew 26:20-30). The Supper is a visible sign of the new heaven and the new earth. "Blessed are those who are invited to the marriage supper of the Lamb," (Revelation 19:9; see 19:7-9; 21:1-4; Isaiah 61:10).

In every instance of feeding, God displays in real and immediate way God's grace.

This is a love for the unworthy. It is a love which alone makes us worthy; we are loved! This Supper is costly; it is borne by Jesus. This Supper is for those who are lost and forgotten, for those rejected by polite society, for sinners, for the poor, for all in need. This Supper challenges the continuing ruthlessness of those who withhold bread from others in this world. The Supper says that God intends another way. The Supper puts forth a new reality, the reality of God.

The Supper is the paradigm for the church's mission involvement. It is the bridge between our worship and our activity in the world. In both, we affirm a life lived by God's grace.

## *Deacons' Report*

Following a mutual agreement between the Board of Deacons and Lord Baltimore Elementary School, funds in the local mission Lord Baltimore Fund have been redirected to the support of the Stop Hunger Now mission project. The fund has been renamed the Stop Hunger Now Fund. Many thanks to Bruce Hobler for preparing and submitting a grant request to Presbytery for matching funds to help Ocean View Presbyterian with this project.

The Deacons selected representatives to serve on the Nominating Committee for the 2011-2012 year. Bruce Hobler was chosen as Representative and Jim Hartsig was chosen as First Alternate.

The role of shepherding to the congregation continues to be a focal point among your Deacons. A comprehensive list of shepherding responsibilities was drafted and sent to Session as an addendum to the Deacons Job Description. The Deacons are pursuing a path of caring for the congregation, both individually and collectively, that is compassionate and practical.

During their August meeting the Deacons decided to move the day of their monthly meetings from the first Friday of the month to the first Wednesday. The time is still under discussion. However, the next meeting is scheduled for Wednesday, September 7 at 2:00 P.M.

## Building and Grounds

The Spring work day was successful. The biggest thing accomplished was the removal of the bushes on the North side of the Sanctuary. Thanks to George Young for his pickup pulling the bushes out. Shortly after the work day Dave Sergison and Cathy Yantz planned and planted knock out roses and a border of marigolds. Our neighbors across the street have commented on how nice the planting looks.

Continuing on to the work list, Herb Sheets designed and built new stairs for the entrance to the nursery of Fellowship Center. Great job Herb!

The church bell pull separated from the bell and Bob Doherty laddered up into the belfry and reattached the pull. Bell ringing is again possible.

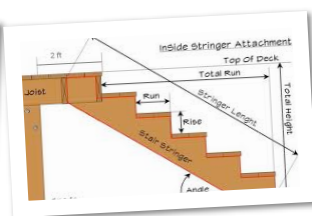
On the south side of the Sanctuary a large hole in the skirting was thought to be a possible way that feral cats could get into the crawl space and perhaps make a nesting area. Herb, Bob, Mike and Buzz replaced an eight foot section of the skirting with white board. No cats were found in the crawl space. B&G is planning to put an additional access to the crawl space on the north side of the church building.

The floor of the MH kitchen was flooded while doing the dishes after the soup and salad dinner. At first it was believed that the grease trap had backed up. The trap was cleaned out. That was not the

problem. The problem was the drain from the dishwasher. It was very powerful and lifted the drain piping out of the floor drain. A plumber was called and all the sink drains and the dishwasher drain were re-worked, tied together and fixed in place. However, the floor drain did back up once during the "Heavenly Luncheon" days. The floor drain strainer clogged and a lesson was learned. The strainer must be checked periodically when using the sinks and dish washer.

It was very hot during the "Heavenly Luncheon" and the MH air conditioning (A/C) system really worked to keep the hall cool. But as the workers were leaving the last day of the luncheon water was found dripping from a light fixture. The fixture lens cover was actually about a quarter full of water. Tracing down the water, Bob and Buzz found the drip pans under the A/C units in the attic had filled up and ran over. This is not supposed to happen. The pan drains were open to the central drain line. On A/C systems the main drain line starts at the bottom of the cooling coil. This it was determined to be blocked. Our A/C company came out and blew the lines out and all is okay now. These lines should be blown out at least once a year, but the maintenance man said both a Fall and Spring blow out is recommended.

B&G has been attempting to get proposals on several items that will reduce our carbon footprint.



*Building and Grounds continued...*

First of all the various companies have recommend that there be a priority list of what will give the biggest bang for the buck. The recommendations were to first get some insulation in the attic of the Sanctuary. There is none there now. Secondly we should get the A/C distribution piping under the Sanctuary repaired. There are many leaks and we are not getting the complete output on the units into the Sanctuary. Perhaps some consideration should also be given to the in floor furnaces and to the 20 year old A/C units for the Sanctuary.

B&G is still trying to get at least three proposals for all the insulation and A/C jobs.

For several years arborists have recommended that a couple of our trees in the cemetery

should be taken down before they fall down and possibly do some damage. This year Bob Clark got estimates for two trees in the front of the cemetery and several other trees along the borders of the church property. He ended up getting three trees removed and several limbs extending into adjoining properties removed. Getting the estimates and a contract signed was a real lesson in the Slower Lower Delaware concept. Now we need to put forth some TLC to extend the lives of the big oaks and all trees remaining on the property.

B&G has had a want ad in the bulletin for help with weeding the parking lot and walks. It is estimated that this a two to three hour job every couple of weeks. No one has responded. Do you know someone who might volunteer for this task?

## Advent Devotional 2011

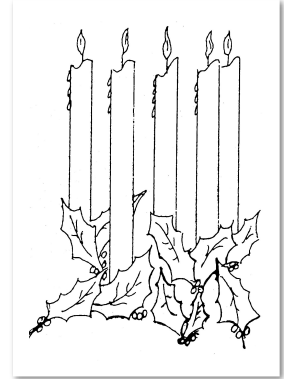
Worship Committee

## *English as a Second Language*

In June the Christian Education committee suggested to Session that OVPC might be able to offer adult English as a Second Language (ESL) classes one night each week. Session asked Jennifer Read to do a needs assessment in the community and report back to them. Her report to the August meeting of Session was:

- In regard to offering English classes to the international students who are in this area every summer, it was learned that these students are recruited by the Bethany-Fenwick Chamber of Commerce based partly on their ability to speak English. Jennifer attended one of the social events held for these students at St. Martha's Episcopal church and learned that, even though the students were all relatively fluent, they were interested in a class that would offer them a chance to learn more American English idioms and colloquialism. It's too late to get these classes started this year, but we will stay in touch with other organizations that offer services to these students. As planning begins for spring 2012, ESL classes at OVPC could be one of those services.
- In regard to offering English classes to immigrant families, it was learned that classes are already offered on Sunday afternoons at Our Lady of Guadalupe in Roxanna and on Thursday evenings at Frankford Methodist Church and the Frankford Public Library. These classes are offered by St. Ann's Catholic Church. The people who run this program at St. Ann's indicated that they moved their program to Frankford because there just aren't many immigrant families in the Ocean View area. There is a need for more ESL classes, offered in Frankford on another night. Currently Session is looking into places in Frankford where OVPC can offer these classes.

Christian Ed update: Beginning on Sept 11, after worship, in the Fellowship Center, we will start a series on "What Presbyterians Believe." The class will use material from Presbyterians Today as a study guide. The class will run each Sunday morning until Thanksgiving. The first session will be led by Gary Baer and is about the Trinity. Other sessions look at what we believe about Jesus, sacraments, confession, evil, forgiveness, Biblical justice, the end of the world, and why we consider ourselves a connectional church.

Small group study will begin in October. Our resource for this will be "Made for Goodness" by Desmond Tutu and his daughter Mpho Tutu. Archbishop Tutu and his daughter, also an Episcopal priest, share the message that we are made for goodness and how we can live up to our destiny. Archbishop Tutu experienced apartheid and later chaired South Africa's Truth and Reconciliation Commission. Books are available through [Amazon.com](http://Amazon.com) for \$10.87. ## *Appreciative Inquiry Group*

Most of you participated in a survey this summer. Members of the church tried to visit every home to ask just a few questions about your positive experiences with churches in the past and your wishes for the future of Ocean View Presbyterian Church.

This survey was the result of training on appreciative inquiry offered in the fall of 2010 by Dr. Marilyn Johns.

Based on the research and work of David Cooperrider at Case Western Reserve University, appreciative inquiry is an approach to organizational change based on strengths rather than weaknesses, on a vision of what is possible rather than an analysis of what is not. Dr. Johns explained that the theories behind appreciative inquiry are:

- What you focus your energy on increases.
- Focusing on what you want to see achieved rather than on what you do not want to see promotes effectiveness.
- Every individual, team and organization has positive qualities to be discovered. Focusing on the positive and working from strengths is more engaging to people than telling them they are a problem that needs to be fixed.
- People are receptive to being asked to share positive aspects of themselves through the process of telling stories.
- Organizations are living social structures. Through telling our stories we can co-construct the social systems we engage in daily. Through enhanced interactions we can impact processes including communication, conflict resolution, decision making, performance appraisals, and team interaction.

Based on this training, a committee was formed to survey church members about their positive experiences at Ocean View Presbyterian and at any church they had previously attended. The responses fell into one of four categories: Communication; Christian Education; Pastoral Transition; and Fellowship.

In August Beverly Bailey presented these findings to a meeting of Session. More information about this will follow.
