What all this new yearing is more deeply about, though, is that time itself is cyclical, and therefore life can be thought of as cyclical, and therefore any life can have a beginning and end, but more importantly many beginnings and endings. This idea undergirds that most human of ventures, hope. If some things end, there is hope for what comes after them. If some things begin, then we can begin again; we can be new; we can be who we wanted to be, *and* have that change accepted by others; we can lose the labels that we and others apply in order to hold us back, to silence us, or even to shame us. More importantly, and specifically for us as Christians, we can be new/different, in that confessional formula:


If any person is in Christ, that one is a new creation; behold, the old self is gone, a new life has begun!

We who once were far away, are now near. We who once did not know God, now know and are known of God. There remains a certain little bit of ambiguity, because no-one has seen God, but we have seen God in Christ, so a lot is familiar! In the third chapter of John's first letter, we read: *Beloved, we are God's children now; it does not yet appear what we shall be, but we know that when He (Christ, in the Parousia) appears, we shall be like Him, for we shall see Him as He is.*

That seeing, of course, will be outside of this box we call time, where *nihil novi sub sole* (there is no new thing under the Sun), where the hope of lasting change is so often defeated by the sameness of all that is around the changed one, reinforcing habit, and worldly ways. We will be back, in Eden; we will be at the end, in the New Jerusalem; we will be in the presence of God wherever we are, seeing, feeling, hearing, loving just as we do now, but without fault.

As years succeed years, this can be easy to lose sight of, figuratively, as our sight worsens, literally. But then, we come to our church, our congregation of like-minded (in the mind of Christ), hopeful (in the sure hope of our redemption), joyous (in the joy of all the host of heaven) people; people who love, accept, and welcome us whatever day of the year, on whoever's calendar, it is - and we are glad! From Celtic Daily Prayer I, by the Northumbria Community, p. 238:
This day is a new day, that has never been before.
This year is a new year, the opening door.
Enter, Lord Christ – we have joy in your coming.
You have given us life; and we welcome your coming.
I turn now to face you, I lift up my eyes.
Be blessing my face, Lord, be blessing my eyes.
May all my eye looks on be blessed and be bright,
My neighbors, my loved ones be blessed in your sight.
You have given us life, and we welcome your coming.
Be with us, Lord; we have joy, we have joy.
This year is a new year, the opening door.
Be with us Lord; we have joy, we have joy.

Frankford Presbyterian Thrift Shop News Elaine and Bob Wolf

As we closed out the last Saturday of 2023 at the Frankford Thrift Shop with a holiday meal with the regular volunteer staff, Peggy Shaffer shared some year-end facts that cemented our belief that the store is an incredible gift to the community. Sales for the year reached about \$28,000 which was enough to fund the church's operation for the year and allow for monetary gifts to other missions and ministries including:

≈ Other Local Missions / Frankford Fire Hall Meals (Ministerium) \$1,000.00

In addition to the monetary gifts that were made, the store reached out to the community in so many other ways:

- ≈ The primary mission of offering clothes, furniture and other items at very low prices.
- Supporting the homeless by offering clothing, sleeping bags (when available), blankets, etc. at no charge.
- ≈ Supporting their own small food pantry.
- Supporting a family that moved to the area with no possessions at all by supplying them with clothing and household goods at no charge.
- ≈ Supplying school supplies to the John M Clayton school store.
- ≈ And so many more little acts of love that make it such a special place...

The Nearly New Thrift Shop could not keep going without the help of the volunteer staff. We regularly ask for help from our congregation twice a year for the great seasonal clothing swap, but the truth is the store needs help all year long and it is a great way to give back to the community. You don't need any special skills or have to commit to any regular schedule and we can even find something for you do while sitting down! The store is open on Friday from 9 to 5 and on Saturday from 9-1. If you prefer to team up with someone, Kathy Sheetz usually works on Fridays and Bob and Elaine work on Saturdays. We would love to have you join us – just show up or give us a call.



Finance Committee Bob Wolf

Well, its that time of year again when the Finance Committee and Session are working together to figure out what our budgetary needs are going to be for the upcoming year and it is, quite honestly, not the most pleasant task that we take on every year. Unlike determining what our personal budget will look like, being able to predict accurately what our income and expenses will be, for our church, we only can predict what our expenses will be with any certainty and must rely on historical information to estimate what our income will be. Its almost a David and Goliath story; our expenses hover over us like a giant enemy; unrelenting and we stand steadily backed by our faith-based budget.

If you remember, a letter was sent to the congregation early in 2023 explaining that we once again faced a budget deficit and asked each household to consider increasing their giving. We believe that those that were able to, did and are grateful. Our various committees also watched their spending, and many individuals took responsibility for some expenses and treated them as a donation to the church. Again, we are very grateful, and it all helped to dramatically close the gap between our income and expenses but not completely.

We will once again be facing a deficit budget for 2024 and ask that each of you prayerfully determine what you are able to give and make a pledge with God to make those regular contributions, and maybe even a little bit extra from time to time. It is through your generous offerings that we can pay the necessary expenses to keep our doors open and to continue the many ministries and missions that OVPC offers.

- If you are unable to be in church, don't just skip that week but double up next time you come.
- If you are a member but live out of town, we still need your help! Even though you can't be with us physically we encourage you to join us in worship online or anytime for that matter via our Facebook page or YouTube channel.
- If you are unable to be in church for an extended amount of time, or you don't have offering envelopes, there are several options available to you to submit your contribution.
 - Good old United States Postal Service. Mail your Offering to us.
 - From the OVPC home page: Click on Donate to submit your offering via PayPal
 - Make an online payment through your bank. They will send the check for you!
 - Do you have to take a Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) from your retirement account? Consider making an annual lump sum contribution to the church directly. By having the distribution sent directly to the church it is not considered income to you and may lessen your tax burden at the end of the year; it may even put you in a lower tax bracket!

Giving Envelope Update

We typically have many boxes of Offering Envelopes that are not picked and go to waste either because the member now lives out of town or uses a different method of contributing to the church. This year, the Finance Committee has opted to forgo the practice of ordering pre-printed envelopes and has ordered fewer blank envelopes for those who wish to receive them. If you would like a box of envelopes, please call Diane in the office.

Each box traditionally included 2 extra envelopes in the beginning of the book – please do not forget:

- Initial Offering please consider kicking off the new year with an extra contribution whether you are utilizing envelopes or not
- Per Capita please do not forget to remit your \$30.00 per member payment.

Per Capita Update

Every year, each member of the congregation is asked to submit a per capita payment. If you are not familiar with what per capita is, "The official definition: "Per capita is an opportunity for all communicant members of the Presbyterian church through the governing bodies [mid councils] to participate equally, responsibly, and interdependently by sharing the cost of coordination and evaluation of mission; and of performing ecclesiastical, legislative, and judicial functions that identify a Reformed Church, while at the same time strengthening the sense of community among all Presbyterians" (GA Minutes, Part I, 1995).

For 2024, our per-capita payment will remain the same as it was last year at \$30.00 per individual member. It will be distributed as follows:

- General Assembly \$ 9.80
- Synod of the Mid-Atlantic \$1.15
- New Castle Presbytery \$19.05

Per our past Stated Clerk of the General Assembly, Rev. Dr. J Herbert Nelson, "Per Capita is crucial to the overall health of the PC(USA), because it binds presbyteries, synods, and congregations together in one church."

You know who you are, I know who you are, and Jesus knows who you are.




I will continue to shop and deliver a carload every month until school lets out for the summer. I am reminded of the song made famous by Frank Sinatra – It was a Very Good Year!

Vital Congregational Team Jen Read

Since we began our work on Vital Congregations earlier this year, our group of ten has met monthly to discuss various topics related to church life. During these times we focus on how a clear understanding and thoughtful use of these ideas will help those of us who are receiving this training infuse vitality and enthusiasm into an already-energetic congregation. Ultimately we hope to make all interested members of the congregation partners in this work.

Our centering word back in July was "courage", a value that is closely dependent on faith and on trust, not only in our personal lives, but also in our corporate work. After we lost Elsie Young a few months back, I wrote her family that I believe Elsie's strong faith, a belief that "God has my back", is what gave her the courage to speak out in her irascible way. She spoke the truth to power and all of us needed to hear because she trusted that God wanted her to.....

"Be strong and courageous. Do not be afraid or terrified because of them, for the Lord your God goes with you; he will never leave you nor forsake you." (Deuteronomy 31:6 NIV)

Some of us feel that an advantage in church work is that most are somewhat like-minded. Because of that, our level of trust in working with others at church is higher than it would be in other areas of our lives. But even church members have differing opinions on important issues. Sometimes we have to speak out against a popular idea or a proposal that is brought forth by someone we like and admire.

A key component of trust in any group is that each person feels a part of the whole. Each person encourages involvement toward others and is offered involvement from them. Conversely, any behavior which implies rejection creates barriers to the trust in the group. An individuals lack of commitment to the group is another example of trust-inhibiting behavior. So is speaking out against or questioning a motion that has the enthusiasm of your committee. In a group where trust is already high, these actions have less chance of eroding group trust. But in any case, speaking your truth to a group involves a certain level of risk; taking that risk requires courage. The interesting and wonderful thing about mustering courage is that after one person on a committee does it, others are more likely to speak their own truths. One person's courage to speak their truth to the group engenders trust in other members of the group.

The scripture that helps me the most when I am called to speak at the last minute or to give my opinion in a contentious setting is this one:

"But you, Lord, do not be far from me. You are my strength; come quickly to help me." (Psalm 22:19 NIV)

For a committee, any group, or any church to be strong, there must be trust. People need to believe they are safe in the group setting. When people lack trust, they resort to self-protecting, non-problem-solving behaviors. None of these will increase strength, vitality, or trust in our church.

Let us all do our part to creating a culture of trust in our committees and groups so that members will speak the truth that strengthens OVPC. And remember that God "has our back" and will never abandon us, especially when we are seeking the courage to do his work in our church.

Recipes from the December Dinner

Maggie's Kielbasa

3 lbs Kielbasa cut into pieces

1 cup brown sugar

1 can crushed pineapple

1 bottle chili sauce

1 onion coarsely chopped

Rinse out chili bottle with 1/2 bottle of water and add it.

Everything goes into a crockpot and stir well. Cook for approximately 8 hours.

Dump Cake

Total Time: 60 minutes

Prep Time: 5 minutes

Cook Time: 55 minutes

INGREDIENTS

- 1 (21-ounce) can cherry pie filling
- 2 (8-ounce) cans crushed pineapple in juice
- 1 (15.25-ounce) box white or yellow cake mix
- 3⁄4 cup unsalted butter (11⁄2 sticks)
- Whipped cream or Vanilla ice cream, for serving (optional)

Step 1 Heat oven to 350 degrees with the rack in the center position.

Step 2

Add the cherry pie filling and the crushed pineapple, including any juices, to a 9-by-13-inch (3-quart) baking dish. Using a spatula, evenly spread the mixture across the baking dish (there is no need to mix it). Scatter the cake mix evenly on top, without stirring, and smooth the top.

Step 3

Melt the butter and drizzle evenly on top of the cake mix. If there are any dry spots, spread the butter out wherever it pools (gently tilting the baking dish works well here).

Step 4

Bake on the center rack until the top is golden brown and the fruit is bubbling, 45 to 50 minutes. Warm just before serving. Top with whipped cream or vanilla ice cream, if desired.

Nativity Festival Wassail Punch

Wassail Punch - makes 2 gallons

1 gallon Apple Cider (128 oz)

2 quarts pineapple juice (64 oz) 1 quart of orange juice (32 oz) 1 C lemon juice (8 oz)

4-8 sticks of cinnamon

1-2 Tablespoons of whole cloves 1 orange sliced $1\!/\!4"$ and halved Honey or sugar to taste

Combine ingredients in a large stove pot or crock pot, reserving 1/2 tablespoon of whole cloves for serving. Heat on a low temperature for 1-2 hours making sure the wassail does not come to a simmer or boil. Let the flavors combine. Taste to see if it needs any honey or sugar. Serve warm and top with slices of orange pierced with whole cloves.
