Greetings in Christ, Congregants, Friends, and Readers: Peace be with you!

November is, above all else, the month in which we give thanks; in both good seasons and bad. Thanks for what God has given, and thanks for how God has preserved us, even thanks that we are here for another day filled with challenges we did not want. Regardless of which we are experiencing, we will discover how much there is to be thankful for just as soon as we begin to look! This is Poem 2, from Book 2, of *The Consolation of Philosophy*, by Boethius. Boethius was a Christian of the early 6th century, imprisoned (and to be executed) on the basis of his Christianity; in short, a martyr:

If free-handed Plenty should dispense riches from her cornucopia as plentiful as the sands cast up by the storm-tossed sea, or as the stars that shine in heaven on clear nights, people would not stop crying their miserable complaints.

Even though God were overgenerous with treasures of gold, and deigned to satisfy every plea; if God honored the ambitious with the greatest honors, still all this would not satisfy.

Ravenous greed would endeavor everything and then discover other wants. No bridle can restrain our disordered desires within reasonable bounds. Even when one is filled with great favors, they burn with thirst for more. No person can be rich, who cries fearfully and considers themselves poor.

My late, and most dear, Mother-in-Law, Fran Duncan, would ever say (and her lovely daughter often quotes her!): "Be who you are, frog". That is to say, no part of life comes to us because it is pre-ordained or deserved - good or bad! We take the lot we're given day to day, thankful we may work, or rest, or both, with and inside that lot, for the sake of others and for our own sake. To take joy in doing that is well on the way to being a joy-filled person in all passes and times and circumstances. Gifts and benefits and blessings are invisible until we Merely seeing is not look at them! believing, we always say; I would add merely accepting is not doing, is not being! What God gives God gives abundantly; we are to not merely seek abundance (that is selfish), but to see abundance. It is there!

I hope you will come to the Ecumenical Thanksgiving Service of the Southeast Sussex Ministerium (it is here, as it has been in years past). Please bring, if you do, a note of gratitude. If it is for someone, give it to them. If it is more general, we will collect it in a basket, which we will bless! If you are

bringing baked mini-breads, THANK YOU! Honestly, it is one of my favorite services, each year.

I'm not going to go on; this is a letter, not a sermon: I love you all, and I have seen the love you have for one another. Let love do its work, and be thankful! Here's a poem from Sidney Lanier:

As the marsh hen secretly builds on the watery sod,
Behold I will build me a nest on the greatness of God:
I will fly in the greatness of god
as the marsh hen flies
In the freedom that fills all the space
'twixt the marsh and the skies:
By so many roots as the marsh grass sends in the sod
I will heartily lay me ahold on the greatness of God:
Oh, like to the greatness of God
Is the greatness within
The range of the marshes, the liberal marshes of Glynn.

REMINDER The Finance Committee continues to feel, indications are we will still be short at least \$20,000 at the end of the year. We anticipate there will be a need to transfer at least \$10,000 from our brokerage account to the General Fund account.

Medicare Fraud: Shut It Down

The best way to stop Medicare fraud? Help prevent it in the first place. Follow these 3 tips to protect yourself from scammers:

- 1. If you get a call, text or email asking for your Medicare Number, don't respond. Don't give your Medicare card or Medicare Number to anyone except your doctor or people you know should have it. Remember, Medicare will never call you unprompted and ask you for your personal information.
- 2. Check your Medicare Summary Notices (MSNs) or claims statements carefully. If you see a charge for a service you didn't get or a product you didn't order (like a COVID-19 over-the-counter test), it may be fraud.
- 3. If you suspect fraud, report it at 1-800-MEDICARE (1-800-633-4227). Visit Medicare.gov, the official source for Medicare information, to learn more about preventing Medicare fraud



Pastor Terry Went Down to Montreat

Thank you, OVPC, members all, and members of Session: thank you that one of my terms of call is to have a deliberate, self-guided program of continuing education. At this point, I could stuff a thick portfolio with notes, and papers, from the conferences and retreats I have attended in person, and another really thick one (see the high middle shelf in my office) with the Zoom conferences and programs I have participated in – I don't say this to boast, but to acknowledge that my education was not complete after Princeton, and that it never will be.

The most recent, as you know, was my Monday through Thursday jaunt to Montreat, North Carolina the second week of last month. It was a LOT of driving, summed up in the last ½ hour by the suddenness and beauty of the mountains at the border of North Carolina and Tennessee; that's where Montreat lies.

I was there for the (spelt and spoken carefully, joked OFTEN) HOLY SHIFT conference; designed as a partial analysis and answer to the ground shifting under the Mainline Church (and, now, evangelical churches and non-denominational churches) through the United States. Statistics (these were two of the most compelling presentations, to my surprise), analysis of how we got here, and slivers of hope for the future shared the desks and the main stage/ Worship space the presenters shared.

The keynote address was given by Diana Butler Bass, on Monday night (she could not be present for the entire conference). She offered a compelling historical analysis of the current historical and ecclesial moment, with full attention to the sequelae of the pandemic. Her prescription for the Mainline? A surprising one: that we return to our past strengths in education; specifically for the sake of helping the wider public with critical thinking. As well, that bent toward more

sophisticated thought could be addressed to where we are spiritually, not just socially. Bass advocates for robust Church Schools, Christian Education, and for denominational emphasis on denominational colleges - heady stuff!

The most impactful thing for me, though, as mentioned above, were two sessions (a plenary, in which he substituted for Kendra Creasy Dean, who could not be there, and a workshop) with Dr. Scott Thumma, a social scientist who works out of Hartford Seminary He heads up a huge, multi-year analysis of churches of all sizes across the United States, focused on their attendance and their methods; the work is funded by the Lilly Foundation. As an aside, it is not too late for our own church to sign on as a participant, should we so wish! Feel free to ask me about it; it's too much to share here! I will be sharing with Session, Vital Congregations, and the cohort of New Castle Presbytery participants (pastors and facilitators) in Vital Congregations. Dr. Thumma carefully dissected how grave the crisis is, and pointed out where successes lie hidden amongst the rubble! Sobering, yet hopeful.

I also sat a workshop on missional engagement called Paying Attention. Much of what we learned there dovetails with the online course I am taking with Austin Theological Seminary on neighborhood engagement; that runs through next April. To be honest, I am struggling with the commitment of time; I also will be seeking to put together a team here at OVPC for some of the work.

This is getting long, but I would be wrong not to tell you about the musicians at Montreat: they call themselves collectively *The Current*, and I can't think of the last time I was so inspired by a group of VERY young people. Capable? No, superb! Spiritual? Oh yes! Committed to their faith? Like few people I

have met! Everybody there who wished to go enjoyed the (sponsored) treat of a lovely glass of beer, and an interview session with these seven "youth" at *The Railyard*, in bustling downtown Montreat (for those who have never been, that's a fond joke). We all came

away inspired, impressed, and with our hope in the next generation fully justified!

As I explained to Jim Hartsig, when I went I was struggling with a very balky knee, so I have no photos from the mountainy walks I had hoped to enjoy. I hope the photos I did share will satisfy...
