From the Pastor: Terry Dougherty

The General Prologue to the Sussex County Tales

About the time that April's mists Have moistened March's earthen fists. People take stock of their cash in hand, And head for sun, and surf, and sand. From Baltimore, Philly, and D.C. They make for the beach at Bethany – To birdwatch, or to ride the surf, To cycle, or to tread the turf; To fish in inlets, or at sea, To walk, or run, for charity. To shop in outlets, or for fine art, To give their boredom a nice jump start! They walk the boards, or run the trails; They leave behind their [darned] emails! Apologies to you, gentle reader, and to Geoffrey Chaucer, whose General Prologue to the Canterbury Tales I have now mangled! But the Tales would be a fine (if difficult) document for churches to ponder: a wide variety of people, thrown together by one purpose, could easily be construed as a congregation...

All of the above is because I, as a child of the Jersey Shore, know the time folks begin to weekend and vacation always will move earlier, and later, than the classic three months of Summer. We can expect visitors now, and for a long while; not at the crisis level of high summer, but visitors. We live in a beautiful place; we are privileged to live in it. But the reality is, we also have to deal with the facts on the ground: gated communities are only the most prominent sign of the unaffordability of life here, and that trend is only rising (were I not employed, Pam and I could not afford to live here!). As does happen in cycles, wherever land value (on whatever basis, real or imaginary) rises, we are in fact driving original inhabitants away, and creating a place that selects who can live in it. We welcome visitors, and, if we are honest, wish them well then wish them gone!

As church, we can and should stand in the gap for those visitors, showing real hospitality, and

for the workers who can't afford to live here, showing them love, kindness and gratitude. Already, our Sharing Pantry is a tangible announcement of our love: it is costly (thank you to all who give in this way; it doesn't show in our budget!!!), and it is gracious. We make no demands of those who use it: working mothers, minimum wage earners, homeless and food insecure persons from every walk of life. We can afford to be proud of this, and humbled by it. For if we lose track of being simultaneously grateful and kind, we've lost track of our god, and all god's gifts that we, too, enjoy. And who, to paraphrase Paul, is more to be pitied than those who live on false understandings? Who can be granted the grandest and fairest vision, and behave as though it isn't there?

Charlie Peacock and Andi Ashworth, in their book *Why Everything That Doesn't Matter Matters So Much*, say it better than I can (p. 203): "Your understanding of what is real and trustworthy is still in development. In many ways, you may not know what you don't know. A mix of humility and openness, confidence and grit, and dependence on the Spirit guide all of this. But on any given day, the mixture can be heavily skewed toward human determination – doing what it takes to make it happen. Sometimes, this is courage. Other times, foolishness. You might not know which for years to come".

Christian Education – Bev Bailey – distributed a schedule of CE





Here are 3 tips to protect yourself from Medicare fraud and scams:

- 1. If you get a call, text or email asking for your Medicare Number, don't respond. Don't give your Medicare card or Medicare Number to anyone except your doctor or people you know should have it.
- 2. Check your Medicare Summary Notices (MSNs) or claims statements carefully. If you see a charge for a service you didn't get or a product you didn't order, it may be fraud. If you suspect fraud, report it at 1-800-MEDICARE (1-800-633-4227).
- 3. Guard your Medicare card like it's a credit card.

The OVPC Vital Congregations (VC) Team has been meeting since last summer to address topics and issues of importance to our church. We have explored such values as trust, joy, conflict, values, courage, and how each of these affects our church and its members as we interact with one another.

Now we are prepared to share what we have learned with you, our congregation, and get your feedback. To do this, we have planned an informal worship service on Sunday, April 28, in Memorial Hall. The service itself will begin at 9:30 am, but we will begin at 9:00 am with several small-group activities that will get you started thinking. Refreshments will be served; grab some fruit or a pastry and some coffee and join us for a small-group opening. An abbreviated worship service will begin at 9:30, and then at 10:15 we will go back into small groups where we share our opinions and experiences on the following: "What did you value about a church you formerly attended?"

"What do you value about OVPC?"


"What are your hopes for OVPC?"




Pick one: either rice and beans or baked potato. Nothing else. That is all food deprived people may have for dinner.

"Feed Your Head" Grace Slick

Lorie Hartsig: **The House on Mango Street** by Sandra Cisneros...the story of a young Latino girl growing up in Chicago. Told in a series of short glimpses into her life, it is a funny and descriptive and beautiful book. A quick read unless the reader returns to pages again and again for phrases like, " the dog is big, like a man dressed in a dog suit, and runs the same way its owner does, clumsy and wild with the limbs flopping all over the place like untied shoes."

Mostly What God Does by Savannah Guthrie....such a simple, meaningful message: God loves us...his loving us is a certainty. The author substantiates this through Scripture and her own personal experiences. Her bibliography is extensive.

The Fury by Alex Michaelides

The Teacher by Freida McFadden was a quick read while reading the others. A story of hurtful secrets and long-awaited revenge.
