From the Pastor: Terry Dougherty



Greetings and blessings in Christ, Friends,

I want, this month, to talk about relationship, and relationships. You see, my Star Word IS "relationship"; so even

though I think about these things every day, I'm now thinking of them with still more personal purpose and curiosity.

I want to say first, I am in two relationships with each and all of you. First and foremost, I love you. Every individual one of you, as your precious self, unique in all the world, and all of you, as a single organism working and loving together as a local manifestation of the people of God. Then, and secondly, I love you as a congregation, a whole, with whom I am in a lot of relationships because you have called me: discernment and direction, teaching and guidance and counseling, administration of church life, visiting, caring and memorializing. In that second relationship, I am among you but not of you; I am instead called to be separate, neutral, and responsible. The second is much harder; it is easy to love you!

Second, I want to say you are also called to be in relationship with me – in both these same ways. The two ways can look the same, especially when everything is going well, but they are not always going well, as we know. OVPC is facing change, and to a lot of y'all, I am the one pressing change. When I do press change (nowhere nearly as often as you might think!), I do so because my training tells me it is necessary. That doesn't mean the way or ways I choose are the only ones applicable; only that they are the ones I thought of, through the gift of study, exposure to other streams of thought, and a frank dedication to your wellbeing! The more you are in an active relationship with me in the second sense above, the less this thought that I am "the" change agent will rise. I am very glad we are in the vital congregations program for this reason; those ten members are learning to be partners with me in discernment, able to correct and oppose me when necessary, but not without discussion and persuasion. It is to be hoped they are the first of many to wish to step up in this way; to respond to the call to both lead and follow, in love, for the sake of OVPC and our mutual future, which may well not look like our past.

But all of us have tools to enter this discussion at the level of that second relationship. We have named ourselves a welcoming church, and a Matthew 26 Church; those entail some change, and serious thought in an ongoing way. We are all, also, concerned about decline; about the age and makeup of our congregation; about the absence of a next generation of disciples from this and most churches; about the losses we have suffered personally and congregationally. They are real, and not to be wished away. Bluntly, your creativity is needed a lot more than your criticism. Your partnership is helpful; withdrawal serves no-one (I say these things in that second voice. In the first voice, I mourn any absences just as you do).

That this beautiful, caring, loving place has a bright future is something I do not for a moment doubt. Nor do I doubt we are in fact on the way to it. I do believe it will look different in some ways, and that continuity of our congregational personality will influence all the ways we grow and change. It would be nice if there were never a pitfall, but that is guaranteed to none of us, congregations or individuals. Our discernment is vital in just that space – the one that causes us the most fear. Will we make mis-steps? No doubt. Will we make our way through them together? We must. Will we forgive, receive, and love one another? I have no doubt. Hard as it may sometimes be, that, too, is built into this people of God, this wonderful church, this beautiful congregation; thanks be to God!

The end of all things is near. Therefore be clear-minded and self-controlled, so that you can pray. Above all, let your love for one another be constant, for love covers a multitude of sins. Be mutually hospitable without complaining. As generous distributors of God's manifold grace, put your gifts at the service of one another, each in the measure you have received. The one who speaks should deliver God's message. The one who serves should do so with the strength provided by God, so that in all things God may be glorified through Jesus Christ, who has been given all glory and dominion throughout the ages. Amen.




Well, I should have known my word for the year would be a challenge. When I walked into a Christian Ed session after receiving it and asked what it was, my tongue got in the way, and I couldn't even pronounce it.... But the challenge soon turned into so much more. The first couple of days I just tried to figure out how to use it and what it really meant for me.

I try to spend a half hour each morning before work with devotion and prayer time and it struck me one morning when one of my devotionals pointed me to Matthew 11:28-30; "Come to me, all you who are weary and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest. ²⁹ Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. ³⁰ For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light." So now, I ask for the burdens and worries cluttering my mind and heart that I wake up with to be lifted from me knowing that I have a partner who will walk through my day with me ready to guide, calm and encourage me. Voila! I head to my office with a heart much lighter and a mood much brighter than when I began my day. So where do I keep my star? Right below my computer monitors so I see it constantly throughout the day; a reminder to breathe and let go, and ask for help when the stressors appear, and I want to be in total control once more.

"Gracious God, I can't do it all alone. Please lift the weight of the worry, pain, and distress that I hold on to from my heart. Together, we can take care of it all in ways that I can't even fathom alone. I will live this day knowing that when I start to feel burdened, all I need to do is reach out and you will take me by the hand and guide me through whatever obstacle is set before me. Amen."

What Are You Reading?

Marie Waehler: *Ultra-Processed PEOPLE: The Science Behind Food That Isn't Food*, by Chris Van Tulleken. Chris has a medical degree from Oxford and a PhD in molecular virology. He is an associate professor at University College London and a practicing infectious diseases doctor. As I mentioned in a previous book list, I had read *Eat Everything: How to Ditch Additives and Emulsifiers, Heal Your Body, and Reclaim the Joy of Food*, by Dawn Harris Sherling, MD, which was a physical game-changer for me. This new book by Van Telleken gives us the back story of how, when, and why all these non-food additives and emulsifiers began showing up in our food. The list of medical conditions now linked to ultra-processed food (UPF) is pretty scary: Heart, cancers (especially breast), type 2 diabetes, obesity, inflammatory bowel disease (Crohn's disease and ulcerative colitis), depression, irritable bowel syndrome, DEMENTIA, and others.

I'm also reading a book I found in the "little library" in Rehoboth Beach near my physical therapy facility. It's titled **The Gratitude Curve: Using the lessons of chronic illness to reach personal empowerment**, by Gregg Kirk, who has suffered for over a decade with chronic Lyme Disease which took a very long time to even diagnose. From the back cover: "The book makes a dramatic departure from the expected focus on physical treatments to the uncharted realms of spirituality and mystical healing and their very real impact on patients of chronic diseases." I'm finding comfort in this book as I continue on my own journey with a rare form of non-Hodgkin's lymphoma, which also includes spirituality and mystical healing.

Lorie Hartsig: **The Book of Last Letters** by Kerry Barrett Concerning the WWII Blitz and a nurse who wrote last letters from her patients to their families. Fast forward to the present day and the discovery of this book of last letters hidden away in a small cupboard....

This Time Tomorrow by Emma Straub A father daughter story full of humor and heart, love and death, and time travel.

Anna O. by Mattew Blake was a complicated, confusing story, a who done it. Not a read I enjoyed.

The Women by Kristin Hannah This book is a non fiction story that needs to be told; difficult to read, but should be read, especially by people who think the Vietnam war was a man's war with no women involved as combat soldiers or nurses tending to those soldiers.

Marlene Quinn: I am currently reading **Birnam Wood** by Eleanor Catton. I picked it because it is set in New Zealand which is one of my favorite places we've visited. It's described as "a brilliantly constructed study of intentions, actions, and consequences..." It is a good read. Also on my stack is **The Women**, the latest by Kristin Hannah.

- 2) **Presbyterian Disaster Assistance** the emergency and refugee program of the Presbyterian Church (USA)- works alongside communities affected by the devastation of natural or human-caused disasters as they recover and find hope. Receives **32%** of every dollar donated.
- 3) **Self-Development of People** this program invests in communities responding to their experiences of oppression, poverty and injustice and educates Presbyterians about the impact of these issues. Receives **32**% of every dollar donated.

100% of our One Great Hour of Sharing is formed by the belief that the church is not an institution, but an action. For the Church to be the Church it must be in relationship with those in need.

National Vietnam War Veterans Day


March 29th

some are sent to teach you what love is some are sent to teach you what love most certainly isn't


some are sent to support you without falter and those you must hold very dear indeed
