From the Pastor: Terry Dougherty



This is what the Lord says to me: "I will remain quiet and will look on from my dwelling place, like shimmering heat in the sunshine, like a cloud of dew in the heat of the harvest" **Is. 18: 4**

Greetings in Christ, Sisters and Brothers!

The above is an egregious piece of proof-texting in one way: it is the foreshadowing of catastrophe for one of Israel's ancient oppressors, Egypt, at the hands of another, Assyria. It is also a foreshadowing of a much more distant event, the Day of the Lord, when all three nations will worship the one God, the God of Judah. But it is also a piece of very good advice for God's people: stay back from the fray, wait and watch and be there (still standing!) when calamity is past. Be present, by all means! Do what is needful, by all means – and that always includes what is merciful, what is loving, what is life affirming. But measure what it is you can do well, so that you do not fall from exhaustion – whether in the heat of battle, at one extreme, or simply in the flurry of activity, at another.

The life of our little church is two lives, in the Summer. One is the life of the good neighbor and the good Samaritan: welcoming the sojourners (in their thousands!) and doing our best to be a welcoming and pleasant oasis in a shimmering desert of traffic and frustration. The other is our continuing life as a family of faith that is taking a time-out from many of our regular activities. This is partly just convenience, but is also the recognition this is traveling season – to other places! – for many of us. The rootedness of a tree, and the wide spread of her seeds, might be a decent analogy.


Histories, memories, desires and connections run through the veins of each individual, shaping how they act and move in the world. Like a strong tree whose strong trunk emerges from the earth, erect and symmetrical, beneath the surface of who they are is a much more complicated system of tangled roots that made them grow the way they have, obstacles they've had to grow around, insufficient soil that has given some of their leaves an anemic look, depths of love that make them sturdy in the strongest gale, though they may look delicate. Meeting was adjourned so that we could continue with our lovely pot luck luncheon.



Operation SEAs the Day:

The 11th Annual Warrior Family Beach Week will take place September 3rd through the 8th, 2024, in Bethany Beach Delaware. Each year, Operation Seas the Day relies on the overwhelming support of the local and surrounding community to help make the Warrior Family Beach Week a success. The OVPC Deacons have once again selected this organization to be the July Mission for Ocean View OPERATION SEAS THE DAY Presbyterian Church. Please prayerfully consider donating to this month's mission.

From the Operation Seas the Day website:

Becky Johns and Diane Pohanka's friendship goes back a long way. Their kids grew up together and their families often met up at the beach. There were many times when they'd work together as volunteers for important causes, including helping raise funds for families of victims of 9/11.

So kicking around an idea to help wounded soldiers was not unusual for the friends. The idea evolved into offering a week at the beach for a group of recovering wounded warriors and their families. Diane shared her idea with Richard Katon, a retired physician and in January, 2013, the three set out developing a plan to make this event happen. They each owned homes in the Bethany Beach area, known as the Quiet Resorts, and saw the community as the perfect setting for wounded veterans and their families to relax and enjoy time together.

The goal was to recruit 25 families, selected by the Wounded Warrior Project, the USO and the Coalition to Salute America's Heroes. An integral part of the plan was to show appreciation for the services and sacrifices made by these soldiers and to treat them and their families with the honor they deserve.

To do this, it was essential to involve the local community. As their plan developed, they were assisted by Claudia Thayne at Sea Colony who helped recruit homeowners willing to donate their homes. Restaurants and local businesses came forward when they heard of the plan, now called Operation SEAs the Day (OSTD), to be launched the week of Labor Day.



What Are You Reading?

The best moments in reading are when you come across something—a thought, a feeling, a way of looking at things—which you had thought special and particular to you. Now here it is, set down by someone else, a person you have never met, someone even who is long dead. And it is as if a hand has come out and taken yours. — *Alan Bennett*

That's how I feel about the two books I'm currently reading. I'm at a difficult place in my life, a difficult place in my 12-plus-year non-Hodgkin's lymphoma cancer journey. I'm on a chemo drug that is debilitating at best with extreme fatigue and many other side effects and restrictions. I have decisions to make regarding continuing on the drug or accepting the consequences of stopping it. In the most recent Presbyterian Outlook Magazine, one of the book reviewers talked about two books by Christian Wiman, who is the author, editor, or translator of more than a dozen books of poetry and prose. The reviewer had read his memoir, **My Bright Abyss: Meditation of a Modern Believer**, and **Zero at the Bone: Fifty Entries Against Despair**. I ordered both from the library and *Zero at the Bone* arrived this week. God works in mysterious ways. Mr. Wiman had/has cancer and the quote

above by Alan Bennett spoke to me in the very first of his 50 entries. I highly recommend **this** book. The author had me laughing with his (and my) despair with cancer complications and wrestling with asking God to help and not getting the response we need. I laughed and cried. I look forward to the next 49 entries.

The second book I'm reading is **Good Energy**; The Surprising Connection Between Metabolism and Limitless Health, by Dr. Casey Means and her son, Calley Means. Dr. Means was on the fast track to make a six-figure income right out of her residency, but realized that the healthcare system is focusing on treating the illnesses and not on finding the root of the illnesses to prevent them. She resigned after her residency and is now in private practice to work on preventing illnesses instead of the big business of medicating everyone. It may be too late for me to implement all of her recommendations, but I'm learning so much about the choices I can make going forward. Again, I recommend this book.

Peacie is the primary care giver. 1964 Mississippi presents its share of racial tension which Diana questions....and even Elvis is involved. Great character studies.
