FROM THE PASTOR: TERRY DOUGHERTY

Charism and Shalom, Grace and Peace to you, dear friends in Christ;

I have a request for you: will you please pray for me? We have entered the third, and crucial, year of the Princeton Pastoral Leadership Program, which has already been an enormous blessing to me and to OVPC. As the program

seeks to help me grow into the best pastor I can be, invitation to thrive has been paired with evaluation of how I go about my work. I'm not going to offer any false pride, or any false modesty: I do well at a lot of this work; particularly the intangibles of knowing and caring, and the quite tangible design of worship. The stubborn area in which, while I have made progress, I remain weak is organization/administration. I have abundant help right here in our congregation, especially from my Pastoral Support Team, which includes Rev. Dr. Tom Kort, who will have visited a week ago when you receive this. Everybody wants to help me with balance of tasks/balance of time, with an eye toward not "burning out", and toward not simply flailing about.

I'm not entirely certain where that balance is; I have mused about that in a previous letter. I think both being here and being elsewhere are necessary for my growth, as well as being necessary for my engagement with all of you. It is too easy to fall into the trap of thinking of you as the people I care for, rather than challenge, or *vice-versa*. It is also easy to do the same thing week after week; I hope I set a good example of doing no such thing. Finally, it would be easy to see myself as a set of one, as *sui generis* because no-one else can know what it's like to serve at OVPC. No; I need the example and witness of my peers – hard as that has been and will be to find enough of – both to avoid mistakes and to gain wisdom.

In with all that is this: I am my own worst enemy. Long before anyone else will detect fault, I will have done so; I'm already actively doing so. Two elements of monastic life that I have discussed in a couple of areas of church life are *humilitas* and *stabilitas*, the ability to have a clear view of oneself, and the ability to abide and thrive in one place. Their evil twins are self-loathing and the urge to escape. Because I perceive a microscope on me (unfairly, I know, but still true), I am living with wondering how much change leaves me still...me. Wondering whether the things I do well might suffer, and under what amount of order that might be true. I earnestly hope these thoughts are phantasms, and will dissipate as I make progress; I earnestly hope my oversharing is part of the solution.

Here's a little bit of the "afterword" of Eugene Peterson's *The Pastor*, his autobiographical reflection on his life in ministry (Peterson is the author of *The Message*):

As I look back on a lifetime in the pastoral vocation what I remember most is a kind of messiness: a lot of stumbling around, fumbling the ball, losing my way, and then finding it again. It is amazing now that anything came of it.

...It amazes me still how much of the time I simply don't know what I'm doing, don't know what to say, don't know what the next move is. The temptation in that state of being is to determine to be competent at something or other. Unfortunately, there are many "ways of escape" in which we can exercise or develop areas of administration or therapeutic or scholarly or programmatic competences in the church, and in so doing avoid the ambiguity of being a pastor.

..."not knowing what I am doing" is more or less what it feels like when I am "trusting in God' and "following Jesus"...this vocation means giving witness to what we don't know much about and can't explain – living into the mystery of salvation and holiness. Eugene Peterson; The Pastor: A Memoir. 2011, HarperOne, NY, NY (P. 313).

While I have come to know and like the feeling of being a pastor, and have maybe become good at some of it, I have by no means mastered all it implies. Peterson is clearly exercising a fair amount of false modesty in the above excerpt; he was a master translator, preacher, teacher and communicator, with multiple competencies backing all that up. But as far as "being a pastor", I think there's a lot of truth there. It is a slippery subject. I sit in my office, or in your homes, amazed at how much expertise is available to me just in my acquaintances; if I could be the perfect, most effective possible nexus of all of it, I likely wouldn't need to contribute to the sum of it. But I can't be; I'm human. I can only try to acquaint and re-acquaint all of us, including myself, with ourselves; especially when life throws us a curve. That, in fact, comes from my personality and intuitions, with a trust in God for the amazing parts. I believe that, too, needs nurturance and guidance, all the days of my life.

And it is only on account of that that I've expressed all of the above: I mean always, first and foremost, to be that variety of pastor, God helping me. And I do need your prayers to do it.

May God be in all your goings and comings, before and behind, to your right and your left, above and below, guarding and preserving your life in Christ Jesus.

The Mission Statement Work Group is meeting each Thursday evening in January to develop a Vision Statement and a Mission Statement. Thanks to Pam Price and Jennifer Read for facilitating this process.

Our new leased copier has been installed !

Marti Sommer is assisting Lori in gathering all reports and preparing the Annual Report for the February 2, 2020 Congregational Meeting.

Session urges all committee chairs to get their Session reports to the office by the Wednesday before the Session Meeting: February 2 Session Meeting - reports are due January 29th.

PRESBYTERY COMMISSIONER REPORT

The 849th stated meeting of the New Castle Presbytery was held on Saturday, January 11 at First Presbyterian Church- Newark. The detailed docket and supporting documentation can be viewed at <u>https://www.ncpresbytery.org/resources/docket/</u>

As a new commissioner, I participated in an orientation session prior to the meeting led by Rev. Neta Pringle where I learned the 'ground rules' in a very friendly and informal setting and had the opportunity to talk (brag) about OVPC and some of the new initiatives underway like the new Mission Committee and work being done to author new vision and mission statements for the church.

The day started with the convening of the meeting by outgoing moderator Rev. Dianne Deming and worship led by Rev. Steve Brundage. During worship Ruling Elder Charles Collier (First Newark) was installed as the new Moderator and Rev. Neta Pringle (Honorably Retired) was installed as Vice Moderator.

During the meeting portion of the day highlights include:

- Presbytery welcomed two new pastors:
 - Rev. Kristin Reinhold to West Nottingham Presbyterian
 - Rev. Tim Bostick to Limestone Presbyterian
- The congregation of Port Penn was raised in prayer as the church will be closing
- While searching for a new full-time Connectional Presbyter, the role will be shared by Rev.Sara Holben and Ruling Elder Bob Schminkey. Sara will fill the role of pastoral presbyter, and Bob will continue as Stated Clerk each staffing the related committees in their areas
- Two overtures to the General Assembly were heard. Full descriptions of each can be read from the link above.
 - The first was to concur with an overture raised by the Beaver Butler Presbytery to amend the Book of Order to establish minimum compensation standards for severance payments. We did concur and the overture will be forwarded to the 224th General Assembly for consideration
 - The second was raised by the Session of Westminster Presbyterian of Wilmington titled "A Call for Ending the Siege of Gaza and Collective Punishment of Innocent Palestinian and Israeli Citizens". The overture was accepted and will be forwarded to the other Presbyteries for consideration and concurrence.
- The 2020 Beach Retreat will be held March 6 7 at the Hyatt Regency in Cambridge the theme of the retreat is 'Jesus, when did we see you?'. The workshops will focus on many of the topics we have covered in our Christian Education sessions in the past year:
 - Feeding the Hungry From Charity to Justice
 - Let Justice Roll Down Dismantling Structural Racism
 - Welcoming the Stranger The Bible and Immigration



In Honor of a Life So Beautifully Lived

Charlotte Wheatley and the extended Wheatley family thank the congregation of OVPC for their loving concern and outreach. They wish to share this memorial to Grayson with us.

Dr. Grayson H. Wheatley passed away on December 16, 2019, at his home in Bethany Beach, Delaware after a prolonged illness. He was born in Newark, Maryland on February 10, 1934.

Following his graduate work at Columbia University and the University of Delaware, Dr. Wheatley was Professor of Mathematics and Education at Purdue University from 1967 until 1988. He served as the Director of Mathematics Education at Florida State University and had a dual appointment in the Department of Mathematics from 1988 until he retired in 1999 as Professor Emeritus. He was a co-author of numerous textbooks, which were widely used for educating students at the undergraduate and graduate levels, as well as author of numerous academic research publications. He was an active member of various research and teaching organizations, including the International Group for the Psychology of Mathematics Education, the North American Chapter of PME, and the National Council of Teachers of Mathematics throughout his professional career where his publications were widely respected.

Dr. Wheatley treasured his interactions with students across the educational spectrum, including elementary, secondary, undergraduate and graduate-level students, and proudly mentored numerous graduate and post-doctoral students. He also supported and continued to nurture, his doctoral students after they completed their studies and as they developed their own careers in teaching and research focused on improving mathematics learning. His primary professional interest was in investigating how students come to make sense of mathematical concepts, which he explored through clinical interviews of students of different ages as they investigated problematic mathematical tasks.

In addition to his teaching and research at Purdue University and Florida State University, Dr. Wheatley consulted in schools across the United States and Canada. He was an advocate for "problem-centered learning," posing problematic tasks to students, allowing them time to work in like-ability pairs, and then sharing their thinking with their peers. Later in his career, he and his wife Charlotte established Mathematics Learning, a small publishing company that continues to produce a variety of books and other educational resources promoting problemcentered learning.

In addition to his wife, Charlotte, he is survived by his son, Dr. Grayson H. Wheatley III, a Cardiothoracic Surgeon in Nashville, Tennessee, his four nieces: Anne Hoofnagle, Janet Wheatley, Cindy Wheatley, and Nancy Miller of Orlando, Florida, and a first cousin, Martha Jane Barth, of Silver Springs, Maryland.

CHALKING THE DOORS


God of doors and homes, bless our church home this year and every year.

Lemon Snowflakes (Marlene Quinn)

l box lemon cake mix l 8oz Cool Whip l large egg powdered sugar

SCAMS OF THE MONTH

FedEx is warning customers about a new scam in which people receive text messages or emails with a link to set "delivery preferences" that tries to get them to enter their credit card information.



Government related calls - They are all scams.

- 1. "We're calling to tell you your identity was stolen; you need to buy some gift cards to fix it".
- 2. "We'll cancel your Social Security number".
- 3. "This is the Bureau of Tax Enforcement, and we're putting a lien or levy on your assets".
- 4. "If you don't call us back, you'll be arrested".
- 5. "Use this Form W-8BEN to give us personal data".
- 6. "Click here to see some details about your tax refund".
- 7. "We're from the Taxpayer Advocate Service and we need some information".
- 8. "Click on this to see your tax transcript".
- 9. "Take this FBI survey".
- 10. "You owe the Federal Student Tax".

Remember:

- 1) Never give out your credit card number to anyone who CALLS you.
- 2) Never give out your social security card number to anyone who CALLS you.
- 3) If payment is needed using a gift card it is a scam.
