From the Pastor: Terry Dougherty

The hand of the Lord was upon me, and He took me out by the

wind of the Lord and set me down in the valley, and it was filled with bones. And He made me pass by them all around, and, look, they were very many on the surface of the valley, and, look, they were very dry. And He said to me, :Man, can these bones live?" And I said, "O Master, Lord, it is You Who knows." And He said, "Prophecy to these bones and say to them, 'O dry bones. Listen to the word of the Lord. Thus said the Master, the Lord, to the dry bones: I am about to bring breath into you and you shall live. And I will lay sinews over you and bring up flesh over you and stretch over you skin. And I will put breath in you, and you shall live, and you shall know that I am the Lord'." And I prophesied as I was charged, and there was a sound as I prophesied and, look, a clatter, and the bones came together, one bone to another. And I saw, and look, upon them were sinews, and flesh came up, and skin stretched out over them from above, but there was no breath in them. And He said to me: "Prophesy to the wind, prophesy, man, and say to the wind, 'Thus said the Master, the Lord: From the four winds, come, wind, and blow into these

slain that they may live'." And I prophesied as He had charged me, and the breath came into them and they lived, and they stood up on their feet, a very, very great legion. (Ezekiel 37: 1-10)

Grace and Peace to you in the name of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, Sisters and Brothers;

Here comes Lent - the season in which we examine ourselves for signs of life and health, under our God and for our world. After the pandemic (at least the part we're willing to acknowledge - it is still with us), after our long time more apart than we liked, or, sometimes, realized; after our many recoveries. And Lent finds us still standing; maybe a little dry, maybe a little creaky, maybe a little wary, but standing. Standing and taking stock of where we are now; because it is different. Not threatening different, but unsettling different. Our attendance is down, our giving is down, our volunteerism is down. And I don't mean to be a downer; I am not Ezekiel. But I do pose the question, through Ezekiel: Can these bones live?... and I say, unequivocally, YES! In fact, that is God's good will for us, as it has always

been for the household of god, known as Israel and known for us as Christ's church in the world.

Our penitential season is one of re-assessment, of course, but it is under the eye of our God who never wavers from love for us, and whose will is love for us; steadfast love. Our Bible tells us the human story as a sequence of failed relationships interspersed with successful ones; the factor that mitigates all this is human unreliability, which, in human freedom, pulls the veil over and over again that hides us, and all the earth, from the warmth of God and from all of our and its purpose.

The expulsion from Eden, the first such instance, was not a death sentence imposed by God, but a free (if really bad!) choice by human beings. Yet, God wills our recovery of our right minds, and right relationship, ever since. So much so, that love, grace and forgiveness are the qualities we know God by, despite the hardship of our alienation.

And the very first example is telling, because it is of the first human born "naturally", Cain. Cain was spared the consequences of the second named sin; and it was not failure to keep the Sabbath, or even to honor mother and father. No, it was murder.

We recognize two things about ourselves in Lent. Yes, we are faulty, fallen, forgetful and ungrateful. But also - we can be reclaimed, renewed, reconciled and revived by the God who loves us as children, in all our waywardness. The God who gives us an image, and a power, and personal characteristics we share with God.

Can we live? Yes, and abundantly! Will we live? That is in our hands, all the days of our lives. We can always choose God, whatever has gone before. And God always chooses us.

I wish you a holy and a meaningful Lent, dear friends! In Christ, Pastor Terry





After approving the December minutes, the committee discussed the Services and Sacraments of January and February. Members reported many positive comments from the congregation regarding the choir, the new bulletin format, including the inclusion of a calendar in its pages.

Kathy Sheetz reported that fewer poinsettias will be ordered next year because a large number went unclaimed in December. Kathy also suggested that Worship Committee might want to consider purchasing two arrangements of silk flowers on hand for Sundays when fresh flowers aren't delivered.

Treasurer Jane Bonbright reported that WC's scaled-down budget was approved . We will continue to work with the finance committee to learn the procedures for contributing back donations of service or goods that are made by members.

Eric Neumann will update our outdoor sign for Ash Wednesday services.

Kris Taylor, our liaison to Deacons, reported that the Deacons have selected a treasurer and that they send thanks to Jane Bonbright for her card ministry. Sue Baer, our liaison to Session, reported that Session is conducting a budget analysis and aligning membership records.

Because there are so many diverse activities held at OVPC, the Worship Committee has designed a survey to measure the congregations interest in each event. This will help make the best decisions in coordinating time and resources to provide the best possible events for our church community. The Worship Committee is hosting coffee hour on February 12 at which time we will have displays and information to let the congregation know what our committee does. The Survey of Events will be distributed at this Coffee Hour. Results will be posted by the end of March.

The Worship Committee is reviewing and updating our job description. We are also gathering information regarding the purchase of new large-print Bibles for the pews.

A motion was passed unanimously for the Worship Committee to sponsor a regular WHO WE ARE and WHAT WE DO discussion. The first one will be held after church on March 5. It will be a reciprocal "Getting to Know You" between any members who wish to attend and OVPC. We will give an overview of the history, events, activities, and missions of OVPC. Committee heads will be invited to give a brief explanation of what their committee does to further to vision of OVPC,

This session will last for ONE HOUR. Pictures will be taken, coffee and treats will be served. All are welcome. Those who attend on March 5 will be invited back if they indicate that they want to know what it means to be a Presbyterian. Pastor Terry and those who indicate an interest will choose a day and time the following week for that session.

On April 2, Palm Sunday, after church, we will have a Celebration of the Enrichment of our Congregation. Everyone will be invited to meet and celebrate our newly-oriented members. Again, pictures will be taken and treats will be served. This class will be offered regularly as needed.....and we hope it will be at least quarterly.

Wisdom comes with winters.



I received a letter saying someone with my same name was dying and wanted to give their estate to me. It sounded fishy.

You are right to be suspicious. It's almost certainly a scam. If you went through with it there would be some sort of "good faith" fee or payment due from you to them, which they would take and then either disappear or keep pestering you for more.

My husband got a call from someone claiming to be with our utility company with a threat to turn off our power if we didn't pay up. Was that right?

No. Utility companies will notify you by mail if you are overdue in your payments. Often, during changes in the weather or extreme temperatures, criminals pose as utilities to try to scam people into sending them money. Hang up on these callers and let the actual utility company know these calls are happening.

I needed to call my bank and so I did an online search for the phone number, and five different numbers came up. What's up with that?

This is a new trend. Criminals place fake customer service phone numbers online to trick people into calling them. If you need to call customer service, always go directly to the website of the company, or look on your account statement or on the back your bank card.

Counting our Chickens...

A Thank You Message from Guatemala

Thank you! Gracias! Chjonte! During our recent <u>Chicken Project</u> campaign, we raised funds for 2,240 chickens! This means that 112 indigenous women will each receive a set of 20 chicks, feed and training in 2023.

We invite you to <u>watch this video</u> - a personal thank you message from one of the participants who just loves her fat and healthy chickens!

Back in August, the first group of 37 women started this program. By December, they had already raised and sold their 20 chickens for meat, primarily to neighbors in their community. With a portion of their profits, they immediately bought a second batch of chickens to repeat this cycle. The women report that they are using the remainder of their profits to cover household expenses and send their children to school. Several women kept a chicken for themselves so they could have traditional tamales on Christmas Day!
