I do love to think of New Year's Day as zero hour, the clock turned back to 00:01, the page turned back not only to chapter 1, but in fact back to the introduction. Recomposed, we, as the Benedictines say, always begin again. As my experience of OVPC begins again, with a new Church Musician, and with some new officers, I am humbled by the realization this is my sixth start. Five years gone by, exactly: I began on 1-1-2018. When I think back how little I knew, how much I needed to learn, and how very afraid I was that I would fail both you and God, I am humbled. WE made it through; I would not have made it without your love, wisdom and support.

I remember my first congregational actions: getting a couple of vehicles out of the snow on Church Street, and reaching out to (who else!) Bob Wolf to see if it would be possible to record a sermon for the first Sunday in my new call - a snow day, what with 14 inches having fallen! Bob was great, the handheld mic did its work, and here we are five years on.

I just closed up another box of a years' sermon prep and sermons, and I took that moment, as I have each (lectionary) year, to look back at who and where I was. One stark realization was how much more I rely on my own intuitions and insights (following proper, sometimes fear-filled prayer!) than I did then. There is a very real divide between the academic and the practical work of ministry,

but it's very important not to choose sides - especially important not to let either "side" languish. Either side can be tiring though, if there's not joy in it. I thank you, through tears, as I acknowledge that I went through a season of no joy whatsoever, just recently. I thank you because you cared more about me, than about my role, and that meant everything. Permission is the most important component of grace: permission to succeed or fail; permission to be who you are, and to change; permission, above all, to start again, "forgiven, loved and free".

I am eager for this new year; I hope you are, too. We as a congregation have been through a lot; more than appears on the surface, and we are faced with questions about whether and how we need to adapt to the world after the pandemic, just as we were once faced with questions about how to go on being church in a secularized world. I am very glad that it is with you, all of you, that I will face into the breezes, and winds, of this new year!

The meeting was opened by moderator Pastor Terry Dougherty at 7:01pm with devotion and prayer.

TREASURER'S REPORT

Elaine Wolf reported that all reconciles were clean this month. The Deacons have money to disburse before the end of the year. Bob Wolf presented the financial reports and there were no questions. Bob suggested that in the January meeting he would again explain each of the reports to the Session.

MOTION passed to accept the November Financial Reports and the Treasurers Report.

ORDERS OF THE DAY

The first draft of the 2023 Annual Budget was distributed by Bob Wolf and reviewed and discussed. Line 13 on the budget is the money it would take to bring the last line to zero - in other words what the budgeted shortfall is. This shortfall has been impacted because after COVID we don't have the rental income we used to have. We need to get the word out to the public that we have space available for rent, as with HOAs. We need to do some congregational training on what the Per Capita

is and what the Presbytery does for the member churches. The final draft of the Budget will be presented to the Session in the January meeting for approval.

MOTION approved to appoint Session liaisons to the Committees. See the Committee Reports section below to see who was appointed to each Committee.

MOTION approved to elect officers as follows: Bob Wolf President, Sue Baer Vice President, Elaine Wolf Treasurer, Ollie Robling Clerk of Session, Bob Wolf and Bev Bailey to share Presbytery Commissioner, Bev Bailey as chair of the Nominating Committee with Marlene Quinn as Session Liaison.

MOTION approved to accept the Deacons monthly Missions for 2023

The schedule for monthly Liturgists/ Communion Servers was set as follows: Marlene Quinn and Sue Baer for January, April, July and October, Ray Keeney and Jake Stavinga for February, May, August and November, and Bev Bailey and Bob Wolf for March, June, September and December.

Pam is a double leg amputee, but she is a whirling dervish zipping up and down the school hallways in her wheelchair. The dedication and love she provides to the students are admirable. She is in the process of being fitted for two prosthetics and we pray that she will soon be up and out of that wheelchair running through those hallways.

In the photo, Pam is holding a snack that we provide that gives quick energy to children who come into her office in need of something to eat. She said that it might surprise us to know that many children in SMS have diabetes and a quick snack such as this is critical to keeping them from crashing during the day.

The Blessing Bags list of preferred items we supply to SMS can be found on

our website and inside the Blessing Bags bin outside the church from Monday-Thursday during church office hours. But below you will find the items that Pam said are most beneficial for the children when they show up at school hungry or when they pop into her office during the day in need of an energy snack that they can quickly eat before returning to the classroom:

- Small containers of apple juice with no added sugar
- 2. Small bottles of water
- 3. Chewy Chocolate Chip Granola Bars (BJ's brand or something similar)
- Nutri Grain Fruit Bars (name brand or BJ's brand)
- 5. Ramen Noodle Soup Cups (chicken flavored)

Ocean View Presbyterian Church Donates Funds to SERCAP for Small Grants to Low-Income Homeowners in Sussex County, Delaware

Ocean View Presbyterian Church (OVPC) in Ocean View, DE recently donated \$4,000.00 to Southeast Rural Community Assistance Project, Inc.'s (SERCAP) certified CDFI (Community Development Financial Institution) Loan Fund to support low-income homeowners in Sussex County, DE. The funds will specifically be used to provide small grants for critical home repairs and the repair and/or replacement of individual household septic systems.

Formed in 1856 the Ocean View Presbyterian Church was the first church to be built in this area. This check is one of the largest donations made by the Church to an organization. It comes out of a 15+ year activity helping people live in their Sussex County homes - through hand-building access ramps, repairing roofs, and more. Today, it is the home of a vibrant and giving



congregation of 92 members with Rev. Terence Dougherty as Pastor. "OVPC hopes this will be a blessing to our Sussex County community."

SERCAP's Loan Fund provides a variety of affordable loan products to low-income homeowners, including: Individual Household Well Loans, Individual Household Septic Loans, and Home Improvement Loans. The donated funds from OVPC will complement SERCAP's individual loan products by enabling eligible low-income homeowners in Sussex County, DE to access a loan/grant combination that will help to keep monthly loan payments affordable, allowing SERCAP to assist more individuals and families.

Cemetery Committee

The price of cemetery plots and columbarium niches are going up on April 1st, 2023. The prices have not changed for at least 15 years and are way below market value.

We will raise the price of a cemetery plot to \$1500. The cost of a marker and engraving would be born by the family. The price of a columbarium will be raised to \$2000 and include all engraving. Currently only the initial engrave is included. The current cost of engraving the niche cover is \$350. The cost to add just a death date later is \$300 which the family is responsible for. With the new cost for a niche it includes all engraving.

Purchase your cemetery plot or columbarium niche before the prices increase on April 1st, 2023. Cemetery plots are \$500 and columbarium niches are \$1300
