## FROM THE PASTOR: TERRY DOUGHERTY



### Grace to you, friends, and peace, in Jesus Christ, our Lord.

I have found it both pleasing and terrifying that, as we enter and embrace Lent, I am leading an exploration of the Christian Way through stories inspired by Augustine of Hippo. In Augustine's *Confessions*, he owns up to just about every human fallibility as having variously been in him – whether or not he can ever be free of them this side of paradise. It is the work of God,

in and through Jesus, to confront and reveal human sin and fallibility, and to overcome both with compassion, forgiveness and grace. But the "pervasiveness of sin – embodied both in Sin and sins – has the force of habit that is difficult to unlearn. Indeed, the habit of sin eventually takes on the force of necessity...we find it increasingly difficult, if not impossible, not only to escape sinfulness, but even to *desire* to escape it" (L. Gregory Jones, *Embodying Forgiveness*, p. 62). We are not unlike Augustine, or the Prodigal, or the sorrowful rich young man: even knowing we need to give up our ways, we'd rather put it off for a more promising (and always receding) future.

So Jesus, born shockingly vulnerable, and vulnerable all His life, invites us into a new way of living, a way He demonstrates unfailingly in His own person and actions. This way of life is soaked in the traditional understanding of God Jesus learned from His Mother and His own study: fierce yet forgiving, all-powerful yet gracious, holy yet loving. From Jesus' own lessons, as reported by His hearers and His collectors, we can tell He loved the Wisdom tradition of Proverbs and the Psalms, embracing their difficult moral and ethical demands. As well, we see Jesus' understanding of all God desires for us, and all the ways we fall short. Above all, though, we see Jesus the Beloved embrace the saving, reconciling vision of God and make it real in our world: we see Jesus, who lives in the Kingdom of God eternally, live out the values of that kingdom for our sake and to His cost, in this our fallen world.

What Jesus offers is "a different way of seeing people – not with cultural categories such as important or unimportant, deserving or undeserving, but as beloved of God". (Borg and Wright, *The Meaning of Jesus*, p. 70). So, Jesus consistently approaches people – approaches us – with patience, compassion, forgiveness and acceptance. And it doesn't matter the slightest who those people are: Jew or gentile, woman or man, adult or child, well-intended or

malicious. We are to embrace this way ourselves, to accept Jesus' call into a community, a communion, of those who forgive and reconcile, who nurture and make whole.

We already know how this begins and ends, and how exhilarating and dreadful it is, all mixed together. We know that the power of sin never relents, and that Jesus never gives in. We know that He dies and rises, and that He continues to have glorious expectations of us. More difficult, we know that knowing all this is not enough. The call for transformation is a call upon every bit of our lives, not just the parts we find easy to give up. We need to wrestle all our lives with what Augustine called our "perversity": that we actively wish that which is not good for us, and decline the good that God wishes us. We need to just as actively seek change, and make changes. I am hoping that in our six weeks of examining our lives, in the light of Jesus' life, we will find inspiration and peace, the will to continue and the will to love as boldly as Jesus loved.

Brothers and sisters, we are in this inextricably together: let us step into the road again.

## CHRISTIAN EDUCATION ELAINE SMITH

Pastor Terry will seek, for a Lenten Christian Education offering, to explore two themes he finds meaningful in Augustine's *Confessions*. The first is the concept of *Homo Viator*; the idea that our entire life is a road of becoming, and that there truly is nowhere to be "at Home" in the world. This idea is associated with Augustine's famous assertion that there is a hole in the human heart, and that that hole is never filled until we rest in God. The "lonesome traveler" need not be a person of constant sorrow, though. Starting from James K. A. Smith's examination of his life alongside his study of Saint Augustine in *On the Road with Saint Augustine*, Terry will invite sustained conversation about the twists and turns of our own lives, and how we can understand them as part of our growing relationship with God and neighbor. Some headings from Smith to think about: *how to escape; how to aspire; how to belong; how to hope*. Each of these is taken on inside relationships with a spouse, a mother, a father, including events such as leaving, achieving, and facing death. Pastor Terry will offer historical background on Augustine on February 23rd, followed on other Sundays by "Tell Me a Story"-style talks with fellow congregants.

During January, the OVPC Vision/Mission Task Force (from Session and from Deacons) has been meeting to craft an updated Vision/Mission Statement. During the CE hour on March 15, the Task Force will present its work.

### **PRINCETON SUPPORT TEAM UPDATE**

The Princeton Support Team (PST) members continue to meet weekly for brief check – in times for discussion and solutions. Rev. Tom Kort, Terry's mentor from Princeton Seminary, came to Ocean View and met with Terry and the PST for three days in January. Highlights of those days include: enumerating three essential areas of service for a pastor: Preaching, Pastoral, and Administrative, defining 2020 goals and objectives, and identifying and promoting a local mission project. OVPC's "Way" continues to be: Hospitality, Praying, Listening, and Encouragement.

As part of the Funds from the First Pastoral Call Leadership Program, Pastor Terry gave \$3,000.00 from the Princeton discretionary fund to St. Martha's Episcopal Van Fund for Alex Rhodes. As we enter the third and final year of the PST Leadership program we continually pray for God's direction for Terry and our congregation.
