A Dispatch from the Irish Postman

I've a customer on my route, out beyond town in the way-offs, who farms his little piece of land and sells most of the produce in a stand by the road. 'Tis great stuff, I don't mind telling you, and very reasonable as well. His property's really pretty, as well; it backs up on Pleasant Pond Park. Right on it, actually; the pond itself, that is. The rest of the park is on three sides of the pond, and it's lovely, too; but to stay in the park you need to ramble round the pond, then return the way you came - and that can be a longish hike on a hottish day!

Well, old Ralph - the owner - and I got talking one day in the shade of his stand (and it's none of my P.M.'s business - *customer service!*), and he shared the time-honored solution to that little problem. Seems that, for as long as he could remember, or his father before him, there had always been a little informal path - really a bit of a road - that completed a way all the way round the pond. And in season or out, sometimes more and sometimes less, people had always walked it. With their kids, with their dogs, on their bicycles and even on their horses, there had always been an uneven stream of those passing down along the last edge of the property. From when he was a boy, Ralph had always set out water and fruit or radishes or cucumbers on a little stand down there, which people could just take or not as they pleased: no charge, though some did leave money.

Now, Ralph has a son, and when the son was back from not liking school or much of anything else, he took it upon himself (this was years' gone now) to improve the farm, and to make it more profitable. And he confronted Ralph: "why do you allow all that traffic down by the pond?!? It's OUR land, and we could be farming it, too!" Well, Ralph told him the old stories, but none of that would do! Sentimental, wasteful, wrong-headed, and on and on... Ralph gave in, coz he wanted his son home, and he wanted something to work out for his son, and he wanted the farm to stay in the family come the time - you know.

So our young tiger put up barriers, and enforced those barriers, and improved the land, right down to water's edge. And I guess commercially it was grand, but says Ralph, "my heart kind of went out of it"; so he left off doing the work and stuck by the stand. But the stand...well... it had never been a "profit center"; so the son began to sort of starve it. After a while, folks stopped showing up, stopped staying to chat, and Ralph's heart sank again.

However it was, over time, Ralph sort of retired, the son (not happily) perspired, and a load of good will seemingly expired - til the fields caught on fire. It was bad enough, says Ralph, without that the fire wagons could not get to the pond, to draw the water that would have come so in handy. What was left to do, in the end, was to reclaim what had been, and that was a lot of work indeed. As it would turn out, good will in plenty was there; a great many remembered with a will that fine path, and those fine days, and so they worked with a will and a generosity that restored the heart in Ralph's breast that had withered away. The son? The son wanted out, and Ralph let him (he hopes temporarily!). The old road, and the old ways, returned, though now young people and hired hands do the work. Ralph works the stand, and I'm happy to say that means he works the crowds.

But all that just leads me to think "how sad". Does it not you? Bitterness and striving, discontent, isolation, desolation; and none necessary! It's a thing, I don't mind telling you, I cannot understand.

Session Report Karen Colwill, Clerk of Session

Tuesday, September 10, 2019 at 7:00 pm

The regular September Session Meeting was held on September 10, 2019 in Fellowship Center. Present were Moderator: Rev. Terry Dougherty; Elders: Bob Clark, Marti Sommer, Don Bailey, Cathy Yantz; Excused: Ellen Neumann, Bob Wolf; Clerk: Karen Colwill; Treasurer: Liz Hobler.

Moderator opened with devotions and prayer at 7:05 PM

ORDERS OF THE DAY:

1. Stephen Ministry Leaders: Dale and Elaine Smith

Dale and Elaine distributed and explained the Stephen Ministry Assessment - September 2019. It is recommended that the leaders of Stephen Ministry conduct an assessment of the program, preferably annually, to determine what's working, what's not, and to identify areas for improvement. The Session, Pastor Terry and Clerk, Karen Colwill, are asked to complete the assessment questionnaire and be prepared to discuss at the October 2019 Session Meeting. The completed assessments will be given to the leaders for reference.

2. Facilities Use Committee: Judy Reich - Chair, Kathy Sheetz, Marti Sommer, Liaison

Judy and Kathy presented a detailed proposal to replace all the carpet in Memorial Hall. The committee presented two bids along with their recommendation. The committee is recommending HomeWorks - Carpet One located on route One in Bethany Beach. The Shaw carpet pattern and color is Stars and Stripes. A sample of the carpet was available. The installation will be completed over a three day period. All renters will receive prior notified as to when the building will not available.

MOTION from the Facilities Committee to accept the proposal submitted by Carpet One for \$10,400.00 for installation of carpet in Memorial Hall with the selection of the color - Stars and Stripes. The amount of \$5,200.00 (50%) is due at the signing of the contract. All monies will come from the Capital Improvements Account. **MOTION** made and passed.

Session is requesting that Buildings and Grounds, with the support of the Facilities Committee, obtain bids to paint Memorial Hall prior to the carpet installation. The bids, once received, will be presented to Session for approval. We are targeting to complete the painting and carpet installation prior to the holiday season.

International Peacemaking Coming to OVPC

What is an International Peacemaker? The Presbyterian Mission Agency has a Peacemaking Program at the National Office in Louisville, KY. Since 1984 they have been bringing leaders from partner denominations and organizations around the world to visit PC(USA) presbyteries and individual churches to interpret issues of peace and justice. Over 300 International Peacemakers from 60 countries have been hosted by Presbyterians. By sharing stories of their work and witness, the peacemakers help us understand concerns and provide insights that inspire us to greater faithfulness.

This year OVPC is blessed to spend a week of the month that they are here with Peacemaker Erlinda Maria Quesada Angulo from Costa Rica. Erlinda has been an activist since her early 20's. In 2000, she and other activists became alarmed by the negative impacts of the expanding pineapple plantations in the Caribnbean region of Costa Rica. In 2004, she helped establish the National Front of Sectors Impacted by Pineapple Productions (FRENASAPP). She is the coordinator and community promotor for this organization in the Caribbean region of Costa Rica. She has served 20 years on her city council and is currently president of the Environmental Council for the Tortuguero Conservation Area.

Erlinda will be accompanied by Dr. Karla Koll, who will serve as her interpreter while she is here. Dr. Koll is a PC(USA) mission co-worker, serving as Professor of history, mission and religions at the Latin American Biblical University in San Jose, Costa Rica. Karla visited OVPC a few years ago to tell us about her work, and is supported by our church. Thirteen members of this church spent a week in San Jose in February, 2018, to learn about her work and life in Costa Rica. We look forward to visiting with her.

On Friday, October 4, OVPC will host a pot-luck dinner at 6:00 PM in Memorial Hall for the congregation to meet Erlinda and Karla. After dinner Erlinda will make a short presentation to tell about her work.

Saturday, October 5, 9:30-12 noon, OVPC will host a "Morning With Erlinda Quesada" and how her work has impacted life in her community and country. It will also expand our knowledge of Matthew 25—"I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink.....I was sick and you took care of me...". We have invited all the churches both in our local ministerium and New Castle Presbytery. All are invited....bring a friend who is interested in our own community. Continental Breakfast and light snacks will be served.

Sunday, October 6, 9:30 Worship—World Communion Sunday. Erlinda will preach during worship. After worship, there will be a reception to thank Erlinda Quesada and Karla Koll for all we have experienced and to wish them well as they prepare to return to Costa Rica. The International Peacemakers spend one month here in the United States and visit different Presbyteries around the country. Erlinda begins and ends her journey here in Louisville, KY at the Presbyterian Center and will visit four Presbyteries on the East Coast. We are her last stop. Please come to this important weekend in the life of your faith community. Welcome the stranger and make a new friend...



Receptivity to Care

Most people are much more open to giving care than to receiving it. when a person is giving care, they are in a position of strength, stability, even authority. When a person is receiving care, they are

acknowledging weakness, insecurity, and vulnerability.

As a result, there are countless people today who, though they really could benefit from a Christian friend who would listen and care, instead, tough it out on their own. They remain the strong silent type or wear a smile across their face that is holding back a flood of tears. Society encourages this...especially for men. To show weakness is to admit inferiority.

But God did not create us to be independent. God's Word is clear on this all the way back in Genesis: "It is not good for the man to be alone. I will make a helper suitable for him." (Gen. 2:18). The New Testament underscores this theme with more than 50 verses that contain the word "another", verses such as "love one another", "encourage one another", "build up one another", and "pray for one another."

What these verses don't say is that we alone are to love, encourage, build up and pray for one another. The "one another" wording gives them reciprocal meaning. So, it also says that we are to allow others to love, encourage, build up, and pray for us.

It is most difficult for people to ask for help. Whether it is due to guilt, shame, inadequacy, pride, or fear of rejection, many would much prefer to suffer alone than ask for help. But, suffering alone is not God's intent for us. "Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest." (Matt 11:28). We can receive this promised rest when we turn to one another for comfort and help.

Our Stephen Ministers know all about receiving care. Many of them have been on the receiving end of care at an earlier point in their lives — something that has motivated them to give care now. They know how difficult it is to ask for help, but they also know the great personal and spiritual growth and healing that follows. They know how to respond in a loving, caring, and nonjudgmental manner. They are equipped, ready, and waiting to provide the comfort and care God very much desires you to have.

If you find yourself facing difficulties in life, don't succumb to society's norm of remaining strong and suffering alone. Take the courageous step of seeking help. Open your heart to receiving God's love and grace through another person. Our Stephen Ministers offer the opportunity for a very confidential relationship with someone who will listen to you and provide you with the care and encouragement you need, while Christ works inside to bring rest to your weary burdened heart.
