From the Pastor: Terry Dougherty

Brothers and Sisters in Christ, we remember, thanks to the Book of Ezra, that in the first year of the reign of King Cyrus of Persia, the Lord stirred up the spirit of Cyrus, to permit the people who had been exiled to Babylon (and surrounds) from Jerusalem to return to Jerusalem – and to

rebuild the Temple. We have not been exiled in the sense they were, yet there have been ways in which this has been a less comprehensible, or manageable, exile, just because the campus, and our sanctuary, have always been right there! They didn't, and don't, require rebuilding (or even much sprucing up; thank you Ray Keeney and friends!); yet they have been, in the ways that mean the most, inaccessible. More especially, the ways in which these buildings mean the most, in how they enable us to be a people for and with each other, together, have been exactly the ways in which they have been most vitiated.

Now that we have a new, or restored, Order of Worship, the parts of which I hope feel more familiar, I'd like to explain just why I invented the Reflection on Our Common Humanity. My purpose was to recognize the idea that we need to think and pray together; that is the nature of a congregation – yet we were, for as long as the pandemic held sway, obliged to think and pray apart. How would that work? Prayer chain, clearly. Congregational prayers brought to worship, clearly. Mutual prayers of those in small groups or cohorts, clearly. But what about our acknowledgement of those things and thoughts we need congregational support to say and pray? What about our corporate confession? "Reflections on Our Common Humanity" was my attempt to have us think and pray together, even in the idiosyncratic space of going it alone. If you will indulge me, one last one? This is based on the first chapter of the Letter of James, which, like Ezra, was written for a people who were deliberately alienated from their source of religious and common life, the Temple.

L: Sisters and brothers, we have faced, and will face, trials of alienation from one another.

L: Let us look to our God with faith, and without doubting. Let us not be driven hither and you by wave or wind of change. Lord, strengthen us not to be double-minded!

C: Save us, O God, from the temptation of our own desires, luring and enticing us. Let us look to the good of our sisters and brothers, sharing the word of truth, and our gifts from above. Help us to become mature and complete, knowing we lack in nothing!

L: Sisters and brothers, the Lord blesses anyone who endures temptation; we shall receive the crown of life the Lord has promised us!

C: Thanks be to God!

...and thank you, for indulging me! We, like James' hearers (these circular letters were read to congregations), are still in the midst of this trial. We pray COVID can be brought under control; we also need to continue doing our part. Further, epidemiologists are certain other SARS type viruses lie in our future; hopefully none so robust and contagious as COVID 19 has proven. It is the case that we have seen 100, and even 500-year floods become more common; that we have seen tropical storms grow more frequent, and be much stronger. I don't mean to catastrophize, but I do mean to say a lot of events can de-center us. We need to hew to the way of wisdom, which is the way of deeply considering the good of others, and of all, as well as of acting appropriately in God's creation, as stewards and lovers of life.

Church, and OVPC, will continue to be different when we return. We can weep, or we can shout with joy, about that; but we must come together deliberately to be the same loving, caring community! I thank God we have begun – and I stress, begun – to learn how to be

Orders of the Day

Not really sure how many years ago a group of OVPC women decided to begin a prayer shawl ministry. Marlene Quinn was instrumental in the details, purpose and organization of it, and soon we were meeting monthly on the first Monday of the month (except for September when Labor Day forces the date to the 2nd Monday, and July and August when the group takes a holiday.) The main purpose was to form a prayer ministry which would include giving a prayer shawl to anyone who was a needful recipient whether member of OVPC or not. The prayer shawl was a reminder to its new owner that many were wrapping him/her in their daily prayers, just as the shawl wrapped her up physically. During the monthly meetings anyone can come and watch, learn, or just spend time knitting or crocheting a prayer shawl. Printed directions are always available, and one of the members learned how to knit and has made lovely shawls. To date, the approximate count of shawls shared is seventy.

The Womens Sewing Circle Welcomes All Women of OVPC

The Women's Sewing Circle of OVPC is a sisterhood of women with a focus on service. We meet the second Wednesday of each month (excepting July and August) via Zoom, and all women of OVPC are welcome. We are committed to mission giving, outreach to our church members and community, and spiritual growth through Bible Study. We also enjoy warm and joyful fellowship.

The Circle's Heavenly Luncheon, held in July and in coordination with the South Coastal Library Beach and Bay Cottage Tour, and our Fall Jumble are our largest fund-raising events. These two fund raisers, along with our supporting the Nativity Festival, held in December, are events that bring the community together. They are highly anticipated events and well-attended by people of all ages. Please note: Due to the pandemic, the Fall Jumble is being postponed to May 15, 2022. It will happily be called the "Spring Jumble"!

YARN (You Are Ready to Needle) meets on the first Monday of each month from 10:00 AM to 2:00 PM in Fellowship Center. Women knit and crochet prayer shawls for members and friends who are in special need of comfort and prayer.

Currently, our Bible Study is based on PW/Horizons "What Our Grandmothers Taught Us". This Bible Study is a part of our monthly meetings.

The women of Circle host Coffee Hours on the second Sunday of each month (excepting July and August) after service. Due to pandemic restrictions, the "Coffee Hours" are temporarily held virtually using Zoom. The Zoom information may be found on the church calendar and in the Sunday Bulletin.

We also manage the care and maintenance of the Sharing Pantry which is located outside the church office and is stocked with food for anyone in need. Volunteers sign up for a week at a time to restock the Pantry and keep track of the food inventory.

The Circle partners with Pathways to Success. Pathways provides a program for at risk children, throughout the county, with Cape Henlopen High School being the nearest school to us. Twenty-one members of the Congregation volunteer to prepare a meal once a month for these students. This ministry is currently on hold due to Pandemic restrictions, but we will continue our affiliation with Pathways and resume this Kitchen Ministry when it is safe to do so.

Fall Jumble Postponed To Become the "Spring Jumble"



"The Ocean View Historical Society is now a partner with OVPC in the creation of our labyrinth across Church St. from our campus. This *letter of partnership* from OVHS president, Barbara Slavin, is full of good history about our church. Watch for an event in mid-October celebrating our partnership and kicking off a community-awareness campaign for our labyrinth."

The Ocean View Presbyterian Church and the Ocean View Historical Society are proud to be partnering in pursuit of vitalizing our common objectives. The construction of a labyrinth, in conjunction with our Historic Village, will be an asset for the small town of Ocean View. Our two properties are within walking distance of each other, and the sharing of our assets is a wonderful use of both manpower and visibility.

In addition to our common objectives, the Society is developing a history of the Town of Ocean View, and the first church to be built was the Ocean Presbyterian Church, as it was called in 1858, when it opened. One of the first children to be baptized was James Martin Evans, who became the Sunday School Superintendent, and an Elder for 49 years. This was my grandfather, and he remained an Elder until his death at age 94, making him the oldest Elder in any Presbyterian Church in the United States. My whole family is buried in the adjacent cemetery, as well William S. Hall, the owner of Hall's Store, as the town was called prior to 1889.

Ocean View is proud of our churches, and they are featured in each of the many historical descriptions of the Town. The original Ocean View School was on the land south of the cemetery until 1969, when the land was purchased by the Church. The old building was pushed into a hole on the land, making the school the first burial in the extended cemetery. I have given "cemetery tours" to OVHS members, towns people, and the Cub Scouts.

The labyrinth and the Historic Village will offer an opportunity for our local inhabitants and our many visitors to be able to experience the charm and history of the area in such a unique way. We are far enough from the crowded beaches that one will be able to experience the peace and quiet of our little town of Ocean View.

Koll visited us this summer, via zoom, just as her husband Javier was returning home from the hospital following a bout with COVID. We are so thankful that they have endured these many months. Our Committees Immigrant Justice Afghan Refugee Family Resettlement Help

Called to "welcome the stranger," many of you have been asking about how you can help those families from Afghanistan who are seeking refuge in the United States. The group that has the federal contract for case management of refugees within the bounds of New Castle Presbytery is Jewish Family Services in Wilmington, DE, and several of our churches are working with them to welcome two families in the Wilmington area.

Westminster-Wilmington, First and Central, Red Clay Creek, New Castle Presbyterian, First Newark, and representatives of other congregations in DE and MD are partnering with Beth Shalom, the Islamic Society of Delaware, the Immigrant Justice Committee of NCP, and connecting with our own Interfaith Veterans Workshop to provide support. (Please forgive me if I am leaving anyone out.) Ignite has approved \$18,000 to get resettlements started as soon as possible.

There is a thorough screening and vetting process for the refugees, and background checks for volunteers, as well, to ensure safety and confidence.

The 9/11 Memorial "Tear Drop" sits directly across from NYC, in Bayonne New Jersey, just the other side of the Statue of Liberty, yet we hear nothing about it.

The breaking in the cracked facade forms the shape of the two towers.


