From the Pastor: Terry Dougherty

Charism and shalom, friends, in the Lord Christ, Son of the living God;

Since you know me, you know I tend to ever-explain; that's what I'm doing now: the following is from the 4th century, and the language is patriarchal. Often in speaking, I clean that up; but here in print, I ask you to bear with the text as received –

'I sought the Lord and He heard me' [Psalm 34:4]. If someone has not been heard, it means he has not sought the Lord... When you turn to God, do not seek some favor from Him. Seek the Lord Himself, and He will hear you. He will interrupt your prayer, saying: 'Here I am. Yes, surely, here I am, here. What do you want? What is your request? Everything I can give you is nothing in comparison to the gift of myself. Accept me, find your joy in me, talk with me. Touch me with the hands of your faith and you will be united with me. I will make all your burdens light. So, when your mortal body is clothed with immortality, you will be able to be united with me also in your body. Then you will continually see my face. You will be full of joy, and no-one will take that joy away from you.'

Here in Advent, begun last Sunday, seeking the Lord is our whole, consuming purpose. Seeking God's love in our lives, inwardly for ourselves and outwardly for others; seeking God's purpose for all life, and for God's own creation; seeking God's will, in order to do it; seeking God's presence, to ourselves and to our world, simply to be in it, because that is good; that is very good.

Advent started out a penitential season, with a relaxed day on the 3rd (*Gaudete*) Sunday; from there it has morphed into more of a season of examination, of our world, of our faith, of ourselves. Do all of those measure up to God's vision, in Genesis and ever since? If not, what is to be done? To me, the sort of self-criticism, and even self-flagellation, once prescribed was not, and is not, the answer. Honesty? Yes. Then just seeking, in our own way, to re-enter the relationship; God will do the repair, God will do the forgiving, God in the Spirit will do the strengthening, so long as we

simply stay in it! In touch, in obedience, in love. Sounds simple, but we are not simple people. Seek simplicity, therefore. A walk, a favorite place, a clearing away of all that nags, and deliberately be simple. Rich Lambert, in *Prepare the Way* (p. 16) says: "Christianity is one long promise that stretches through the ages. Christians are those who wait for that long promise to be kept".

Patience, dear friends; we are all in recovery, and recovery is hard. Mercy to yourself, mercy for others; love to yourself, love for others. Love for God. I wish for you a deeply meaningful Advent.

Weeping may last for the night, but a shout of joy comes in the morning! (Psalm 30: 5)

When shepherds shout, when stars sing, when Mary ponders, may you shout for joy indeed! Joy at this slow but real return to normalcy, joy at being together, joy at seeing and loving your families, joy for all that has been and all that will be; joy in the promise fulfilled! I wish for you a deeply joyful Christmas.

I came so they can have real and eternal life, more and better life than they ever dreamed of! (John 10: 10, The Message)

After all these things (as evangelists are wont to say), we will enter a new year; we'll enter with very real losses, very real gains, and very real hearts God in Christ is actively making whole, wherever we find ourselves. Turn to family and friends, turn to what lasts, put aside fantasies and embrace your life hidden in Christ. I wish for you a happy, blessed, and healing New Year.

Now may God, your very loving parent, Jesus, your very loving brother, and the Holy spirit, your very loving healer, be with you and remain with you, all the days and all the seasons of your life. Amen.

OVPC Donates Funds to SERCAP to provide small grants to low-income homeowners in Sussex County

On November 22nd Deacons presented a \$4,000 check to Southeast Rural Community Assistance Project, Inc. (SERCAP). The grant will be used to help with home repairs, ramp access, sewer and septic system repairs within Sussex County. It is one of the church's largest donations to date.

After a letter composed by Herb Sheets and Pastor Terry to the Milford Housing Development Corp., funds were returned to OVPC from their Monthly mission donations, as well as from a Presbyterian Trust Fund called the Spear Trust.

Herb filled us in that he'd been working with Group (yes that was their name) when he brought the "repairs" idea to OVPC shortly after joining. Their work started about 15 years ago and resulted in some 20 plus home repairs in our area. During that time volunteers included of course Herb, Don Benjamin, Bob Doherty, Rev. Terry Dougherty, Jim Hartsig, Ed Hiner, Ray Keeney, Eric Neumann, Mike Quinn, Mike Read, Ollie Robling, Rev. Terry Shull, and Doug Witham.

Now in 2022 Deacons began the search for a non-profit organization to distribute funds with the same intent for which they were originally given. We just know God was working to connect us with SERCAP. We invited Beth Pusha, Director of Loan Funds in Roanoke, Virginia to meet with Deacons to discuss their mission. It was nearly a perfect match to what Herb and the volunteers were doing!

Beth said that SERCAP was delighted to be partnering with OVPC. They look forward to providing repair services to our neighbors in Sussex County. Finally she said our donation will make an invaluable contribution to low-income residents and will keep us informed.

Deacons thank all involved in their time/talents/and monetary donations over the years and are looking forward to continuing to serve God on all our behalf's.

Guatemala Partnership of New Castle Presbytery It's Weigh-in Day! And we have something to crow about

Nearly three months into this new project and it's time to weigh-in. (Drum roll please)....5.5 pounds! This chicken is almost ready to sell and is living proof that the Association's latest project is a success.

This past summer, the Association launched a new <u>Chicken Project</u> to address food insecurity and provide women with yet another source of income. These young chickens (mostly male) are raised for meat, not eggs. They grow quickly and are fed corn, grass and special feed to keep their meat tender, making them the preferred bird for typical Guatemalan dishes like *caldo* (chicken vegetable soup) and *pepián* (a rich, flavorful stew)

Here's how it works:

A qualified woman builds an approved coop and attends required training. She then receives 20 chicks and special feed, and fattens the chickens up for three months. When the chickens near their optimal weight of seven pounds, she sells them to others in her community for a profit, keeping a few to feed her family if she choses. All of the neighbors know these chickens are good quality, so it's an easy sell - and they are happy to have meat for dinner!

Each participant is expected to continue this cycle four times during the year - buying, fattening and selling the chickens. At the end of 12 months, the woman is required to return half of the initial investment (about \$125) to the <u>Association</u> so it can be passed along to the next woman in line. With her remaining profits, she should be able to continue raising chickens on her own, making this project sustainable.

Back in May, funds were provided to the first 35 women, thanks to the generosity of <u>Aldersgate United Methodist Church</u> (Durham, NC), <u>New Castle Presbyterian Church</u> (New Castle, DE), <u>Westminster Presbyterian Church</u> (Wilmington, DE) and the first graders at <u>St. Anne's School</u> (Annapolis, MD). Thank you!

And this project is certainly popular! Other women have witnessed the success of their friends and neighbors and asked how they can participate. Right now, there are 82 additional women on the waiting list with more expected. So we have decided to make chickens our Advent project this year. The official campaign will launch on Giving Tuesday (Nov. 29). Be on the lookout for how you can participate. (Hint: chickens make great Christmas gifts, shares are available, and we have beautiful gift cards.)

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


Winter Solstice

.. and then, just around the corner the new year will begin again, and like a seed planted deep in the earth, we will all rise with renewed energy once again to dance in the sunlight.



The past three months of the 2nd Saturday of the month Work Day had one cancelled due to a funeral service. The Art of Deceit

Scammers use these 7 tactics to get between you and your sense of reason.

- 1. They establish camaraderie "So sorry to hear about your loss . . . The trick: Scammers will parrot back the target's religion, political affiliation, military background or life situation sto get the target to feel "he's just like me."
- 2. They play on your aversion to loss "You've won the sweepstakes! You are now rich! But if you don't act fast . . .
- 3. They flatter you "I can tell you know a lot about finance, so you know how much money you can make in cryptocurrency if you manage the risks"
- 4. They make you feel anxious "This malware means our bank account has been compromised. Someone could steal from it very easily now" (Never give out account number, login id or passwords to a caller).
- 5. They create terror "Grandpa, help! I've been arrested and need money for bail right away!"
- 6. They seduce you "I love talking to you. I have not felt so close to someone in so long."
- 7. They intimidate you "I'm with the police; you've missed jury duty again. Either pay a \$900 fine now or go to jail." Real Police never call you.
