From the Pastor Terry Dougherty

Grace to you, and peace, dear friends in Christ, and happy Spring! Lent, our season of self-examination, is over; Jesus has risen, and has given us purpose; the time of our renewal in the Spirit is in sight. Shall we then relax, saved and unafraid? I'll join Paul in saying *me genoito!!* (let the very idea never have happened!). Quite the contrary, now is the time to creatively connect our hard-won self-understanding to a larger

understanding of why, exactly, God in Christ has chosen, empowered and sent us. In the arc of the Biblical story, it is so that the renewal and restoration of the way God always intended the creation to <u>be</u>, to eternally <u>be</u>, includes us as God's co-creating and co-enjoying companions. We are the ones who, in God's image, conclude with God "It is good; indeed, it is beautiful!" In the Reformed traditions, we say "Humanity's chief and highest end is to glorify God, and fully to enjoy God forever" (Book of Confessions 7.111; answer #1 of the Westminster Catechism). As we move toward Pentecost, this grace is already ours, through the work of Jesus Christ, thanks be to God. Our self-understanding is fully involved in this grateful subsidiarity to God's will in Christ. Bernard of Clairvaux, the 11th century mystic, put it this way:

"for love of neighbor to be entirely right, God must have part in it. It is not possible to love our neighbor as we ought to do, except in God. One who does not love God can't love anything in God. We must begin by loving God. God is the author of our love for God, as of all things. God created - and sustains - nature; it could neither exist nor subsist without God. So that we may thoroughly know this, God made us subject to 'tribulation'. Feeble and needy, we are forced to turn to God; being saved by God, we give glory to God's name. These are God's words: 'Call upon me in this day of trouble; I will deliver you, and you will glorify me' (Ps. 50: 15)."

We, with all the faults we are newly aware of, are beloved of God. Jesus has given Himself for us; the Spirit is with us to nourish and guide. It lies upon us now, inside these "guardrails", to realize fully the person we have always been meant to be; the one God sees.

It was a great privilege and pleasure to be accompanied to a seminar at Princeton Seminary three weekends ago by my wonderful Pastoral Support Team: Karen Colwill, Kathy Sheetz, Pam Price and Mike Read. There we heard two working pastors, Dr. Timothy Sloan and Dr. Thomas Daniel, engage with professors, theologians, ministers, congregational and presbytery officers, and students in dialogue and conversation. Both, at various points, brought up personal weaknesses they had had to address in their ministry. Both talked about how they lived these weaknesses out transparently, in the very context of ministry and preaching. I think it's fair to say all of us from OVPC were very moved by their honesty, and their dedication to working these issues through. There was a variety of opinion in the conference about the "when"s and "how"s and "how much"es of this kind of sharing are appropriate; a lot of it valid. But at the bottom of it all, it brought home an idea and belief I've held for a long time now.

Friends, to be servants of God, and servants of others, we must bring our whole life; not just the parts we are proud of. We cannot know what bit of the mess and confusion, the failure and doubt, might be exactly the road to encouragement for the person God has set before us for ministry; that means we must be unafraid. Our spiritual gifts are so often mixed in with our spiritual debits! Our certainties are so often the bits of us that most deserve to be challenged! Our God writes on our hearts, forming us throughout our ups and downs; our God does not write for us, in manuals, from which we may feel separate. Above all, God gives us others, in whom to glory and before whom to be ourselves, unvarnished and whole.

Let us undertake in this in-between season to be available as both our inward and outward selves; to love and to accept love with deep gratitude. Yes, let's wander God's garden with joy, but let's also notice when sticks have fallen in the paths, and do our part.

Princeton Support Team

As a reminder of the team's purpose, here's a review of the original intent. The First Call Pastoral Leadership Program Is a pilot program designed to mentor new pastors into ministry in a healthy congregation. This 3 year program involves a partnership between Princeton Theological Seminary and Ocean View Presbyterian Church. So, our team has been meeting weekly with Pastor Terry for check-ins and discussion. Also, we have monthly meetings which include Dr. Rev. Tom Kort of Princeton via a conference call.

Recently, the whole team along with Pastor Terry attended a 3 day conference at Princeton Seminary entitled: Biblical Formation for Witness: Missional Meaning of Scripture in Context. It was a meaningful, rich theological discussion with several guest scholars, pastors, and administrative personnel. Four themes were generated from these days: (1) Integration of evangelism and social justice, (2) The role of the Holy Spirit, (3) Practices for preaching from a missional prospective, and (4) Guiding a community to read Scripture with a missional goal.

Another project we've begun is to read and study the book, <u>Canoeing the Mountains</u> by Tod Bolsinger, which contains information of Christian leadership in an exciting new time for the Church. Our challenge is to connect, grow, and serve Jesus Christ as His disciples.

Sara P. 'Sal' Fitzgerald, 93

Sara P. "Sal" Fitzgerald, 93, left this world peacefully, surrounded by her loved ones, on April 4, 2019. She was raised in Philadelphia, Pa., where she was born Aug. 13, 1925. Fitzgerald attended Girls High School in Philadelphia before moving to Clarksville, Del., with her parents. It was later that year in Bethany Beach that Fitzgerald met her future husband, Bob, who was stationed at Fort Maggie during World War II. They married shortly thereafter, on Dec. 22, 1943.

The couple eventually settled and raised their five children in Media, Pa. Fitzgerald was very involved in her children's schools and PTA. She was also quite involved with the Media Presbyterian Church, where she was a deacon, an elder and choir singer. One of her proudest



accomplishments was working with others for the creation of the Media-Upper Providence Library. Through coordinated fundraising, she helped with the expansion of the physical library and its collections, as well as the addition of Upper Providence.

Once she retired with her husband to Ocean View, Del., in 1977, she joined the Ocean View Presbyterian Church choir, which led to her joining the church circle and a long-tenured involvement there.

Through her life, Fitzgerald thoroughly enjoyed time with her family and her summers on the beach. She was an avid golfer and bridge player. She lived a long, full life.

Fitzgerald was preceded in death by her devoted husband, Robert H. Fitzgerald II, and son, Robert H. Fitzgerald III. She is survived by her daughters, Barbara Churchville, Faith Fitzgerald, Sue Williamson and her husband, Doug, and Hope Orhelein and her husband, Michael; her grandchildren, Colleen Fitzgerald, Dylan Fitzgerald, Bridget Fitzgerald, Garan Fitzgerald, Sara Luciano, Rachel Catrambone, Ryan Orhelein, McKenzie Orhelein and Keegan Orhelein; and many great-grandchildren, nieces, nephews and cousins.

A celebration of Fitzgerald's life will be held at 1 p.m., with visitation starting at noon, on Sunday, April 28, 2019, at Ocean View Presbyterian Church, 67 Central Avenue, Ocean View, Del. Interment will follow in the adjoining church cemetery.
