Grace and Peace - this sort of peace! - to you, friends, in our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ!

As a Northerner for most of my life, in this semi-Southern place, my mind turns this time of year to walks in woods changing in color, smell, and the dynamics of all their inhabitants. I know well there is Autumn here, too, and I have been exploring it year on year, on shore and inland, but the Autumn of mixed deciduous and coniferous woods is just different, as are the varieties of birds and animals and insects, all of which memories are my stubborn image of Fall. There is something about Fall both nostalgic and humbling, tinged with gratitude, that makes us mindful. My earnest hope for you is that you allow, and dwell, in this; at least sometimes outdoors. We are animals, too, and we have evolutionary responses that linger beneath the veneer of our control over nature – a control that is only thin, and that isn't only benign.

Civilization has made enormous differences to how we live in nature – or don't – and how we view both nature and the constant adaptation to nature that has been the common human lot: from hunting and gathering to settled lives of domestication, husbandry and farming; from family to village to town to city life; from self-reliance to convenience. Much of that, and the good and harm it has done, is easy not to think about; but think we should. Our advantages have too often meant displacement, disorientation and yes, death for others. Not just other human beings, but fauna and flora that developed *in situ* for millennia, before we brought rapid disruption, and often dissolution.

This is a month for attention to these things, and the life of the church calls our attention. World Communion Sunday is the first day of this month; today, in fact! In traditions that observed the life

of Francis of Assisi, blessing of animals (usually domestic) is observed on the 4th or the 8th. Indigenous People's Day, an alternative to Columbus Day, is observed either on the same day (the 9th), or on the 10th. And World Food Day is the 16th; a day after the Southeast Sussex Ministerium will again hold the CROP Walk at Our Lady of Guadalupe Church, on Roxana Road, 2:00 PM on the 15th: See Bob Doherty to donate, and to sign up to walk!

We don't often think about the relationship between development -"civilization" - and hunger, except to believe that civilization "solves" the problem. It does, and it doesn't. Yes, farming is intensified, and yields often magnified. But farming also is mechanized, regionalized, and narrowly focused. We end up with monocrops, a lack of genetic diversity in our food crops, the failure of local farms and family farms, the failure of families to garden for food, and the alienation of much of the population from the sources of food, at all. We end up with farming that doesn't look at all like our ideal vision of farming: Faming that is inhumane, farming that pollutes, farming that minimizes the humanity of its workers and the God given dignity of its animals. We also end up, too often, with portions of the population suffering in "food deserts", places where it is not economically attractive to set up modern shopping markets, which seek to have every variety of food under one roof. They are expensive real estate, expensive to maintain and expensive to supply. Too many people end up shopping in mini-marts, which specialize in cheap calories, rather than healthy food, because a supermarket is nowhere near.

Every answer, however partial, to these problems, is something we should think about, for God has made it a mandate that we care for our neighbors. We just learned a lot about gleaning, and the variety of ways we can participate. We also – and I couldn't be more proud of OVPC! – have our Sharing Pantry. Those of us present day-by-day, and those who shop for and supply the pantry, know and see the need right here, know and see the variety of people, young and old, who are our customers. Please consider, not only on World Food Day, how you can help; a little or a lot! There is not a little, but a lot, of need.

As we ruminate, with nostalgia and delight, on all we have, and look forward to Thanksgiving and Harvest, let's also give our minds to the ways both local and humane in which we can be better participants in the give and take of nature, and in the garden earth God has always meant for all of us!



Your donations are greatly appreciated! For more information, or to arrange pick up of donations, call Marie Waehler at 302-228-5258.

During the school year, I make a monthly trip to SMS to deliver all donations. The staff sorts the items into bins to be used as needed. I continue to shop at Dollar Tree for personal items and buy the largest sizes of body wash and shampoo. Food items are purchased at BJ's to get the most for my money.

Needed items include:

- 1. Combs
- 2. Toothpaste, toothbrush & holder
- 3. Body wash (not bar soap)

- 4. Shampoo
- 5. Deodorant
- 6. Socks
- 7. Granola bars or fruit bars, peanut butter or cheese crackers, peanut butter and jelly, fruit roll-ups, individual applesauce cups, macaroni and cheese cups, Ramen cup of noodles (chicken), cereal (Cheerios and the small-box assortment are favorites), popcorn and other healthy snacks, and small bottles of water or juice (apple juice without added sugar is a favorite)
- 8. Tampons or pantiliners





OVPC has always been very supportive and generous.

Seventy-five percent of the walk's grand total will be given to CWS to be used to support their programs, the remaining twenty-five % will be divided equally among the churches that have food pantries.

Last year's grand total was \$11,404 of that OVPC raised \$3,545. Since 2010 OVPC raised over \$46,200.

Safety and Security Task Force Update

New door latches for Fellowship Center and peep holes in doors without windows have been installed.

The new door latches in Fellowship Center are designed to be opened from the inside just by pushing down on the door handle. No need to push/turn the locking button. This will result in a faster exit in case of an emergency.

The peep holes are for seeing who is outside the doors for doors that do not have a window. Another safety enhancement.

Operation of the new door latches has changed and is explained below:



Push button in locked position (horizontal).



Push button in unlocked position (vertical).



New peep hole.



New door latch, outside view.



Use the key to unlock the door. Note: **This does NOT unlock the door latch on the outside.**

To unlock the outside door handle, rotate the inside locking button to a vertical position and push down on the inside door handle. The push button will pop out. Now the outside handle is unlocked.

To exit just push down on the door handle. It does not matter if the push button is in the horizontal or vertical position.
