What I Did on My Summer "Vacation"

Greetings in Christ, all, and welcome back to the church year; I hope Summer, here or away, has been a blessed and rewarding time for you. It has for me; in light of that the first thing I want to express is my gratitude. All of you, through the Session and by your encouragement, both personal and financial, have let me know without doubt that my growth and continuing education/exploration of vocation is a priority for you. It is for me as well; it is another way in which we are well matched. I've shared with a few people that I feel often a press of urgency, because there is so much time I cannot have back, in which I was not engaged in or preparing for this work. I could go on letting that make me feel inadequate (and in bad moments I do), but it is much better to engage each day as a learning experience and environment, and to stretch myself whenever possible. That has certainly happened this past Summer, thanks to your generosity.

First, I attended the Engle Institute of Preaching at Princeton Theological Seminary - this one's pretty prestigious, so I'm still not sure how I slipped in, but I sure am grateful! The plenary speaker/presenter, whom you've heard me mention in worship, was Dr. Roger Nam, President of George Fox Seminary. He spoke for five mornings of the books of Ezra and Nehemiah through the lens of repatriation, leaning on his own experiences as a Korean-American. Very moving and insightful; and, though he is not a preacher, a great model of bringing the whole self to the task.

It was out of this experience that I crafted my own 2-part series on Ezra/Nehemiah, which I originally intended to have some linkage to our congregation, where almost everybody is a returnee or an "immigrant". The salience of the experience of the returnees from the exile to our contemporary experience came to drive my exegesis, such that the end product was not exactly where I had started to go. The research and the "transformation" of the text were exhilarating; I hope some of that came through in the product.

I participated in three distinct preaching workshops at Engle, as well: *Learning from Diverse Preaching Traditions*, with Rev. Dr. Jared Alcantara; *Stories of Recognition*, with Rev. Carolyn Helsel; and *Preaching as Spiritual Formation*, with Dawn Ottoni-Wilhelm, from the Mennonite tradition.

Jared covered - really thoroughly! The African-American, Latino/a/ x, and Asian preaching traditions (which are, internally, all multiple traditions, somehow pulling truly helpful illustrations and advice out even as our heads were stuffed with information and both printed and filmed. A few chestnuts, out of many:

"Our theologies are our autobiographies in disguise" - Cleo LaRue

"There are two kinds of preaching people don't want to hear: BAD preaching, and GOOD preaching!" - Fred Craddock

"Don't get up to preach if you are not *there* to *preach*! - Traditional, African-American

We talked about how our power - or lack thereof - may effect preaching, especially our freedom to preach in conscience: "how direct can I be?"; and the "status" of the preacher in various settings; about balancing our voice and our body in communicating; about the size of our pulpit (mine's pretty big); about "folk" and "intellectual" traditions; about pace (again, in the African-American tradition, "start slow, go high, set fire, sit down").

We talked, above all, about questioning ourselves:

What is the *telos* (goal) of my sermon? Explanation? Understanding? Celebration?

Is my sermon redemptive? Do I announce both truth and hope?

Did I set expectations, societal or cultural? Did I meet them?

Did I rouse passion?

We learned to think of the written text as an "arrested performance"; only orality determines pace, pitch, pause, and punch - the means by which we paint a picture, and invite others in; the means by which we move through that world, and return to this. Both our intellectual and improvisational abilities are challenged, as the sermon is planned, preached and published. We are challenged to be both a doctor in the sickroom, and a lawyer in the courtroom; above all, we are challenged to try to restore memory - anamnesis replacing amnesia -so that a congregation, or an individual, might, like the prodigal son, might be aroused, and return.

Newsletter Editors Lorie and Jim Hartsig What is necessary for that to happen is that our "inward" and "outward" calls both be realized (both Emerson and Calvin), and that our "heat" and "light" be in balance (Jonathan Edwards' "Doctrine of Sensible Knowledge"), that we both explain and proclaim.

Out of all that, here are four takeaways for me: 1. Rather than think in structure and form, think in mood and plot; this reduces the inductive work of both preacher and congregation. 2. Engage Holistic knowing; appeal to reason, but also to emotion, intuition and will. 3. Use indirect communication; be invitatory, then discover together, rather than "impart". 4. Sojourn together. Jesus was ever ready to stop, in the middle of all the hurry, stress and urgency of His mission, for the sake of learning together.

From Carolyn, I learned about the necessary overlap between teller and hearer; and that the structure of an oral story is not what hearers care about; rather it is what they can identify with, and what they can admire. We need to incarnate our stories - in agreement with our own Don Benjamin, we learned the best starting place is the "I wonder?" piece. We also need to cross the "disjunction" between "you" and "I"; Jesus was a master of this practice because He was a master of cultural reference. Our "Balcony View" - which comes from deep familiarity with the text - must be ameliorated by sustained conversation where our people are. We can accomplish that, perversely, by listening to another, different story. A story, unlike an anecdote, is open-ended; though it consists of "info" and data, what's important are the universality in it, the gratitude and/or struggle expressed, the things that are in common for all of us. The preacher's attention to the literary forms of the Bible itself inform every story told out of it: what is it doing, how does it function, what is at stake? (Tom Long).

Dawn shared with us many ways to make not just our spiritual practices but also our self-care, vital for the sake of our congregations. Practices of silence, varieties of prayer, the activity of retreat can all inform what and how we preach.

...Then... I attended *The Bowed Head*, at Calvin Seminary in Grand Rapids, Michigan, July 22nd through 26th. It was led by Rev. Dr. Neal Plantinga and Rev. Scott Hoezee; great colleagues and great friends, as well as, in order, teacher and student in their first relationship. The picture is of the whole group on the deck behind the conference room; we were from 14 states and 2 provinces, and we were of widely various experience. All of us shared our experiences of grief: that of others, especially congregants, and our own. The morning sessions were organized around an analysis of three assigned books: *A Grief Observed*, by C.S. Lewis (in whom Dr.

Plantinga is an expert); A Grace Disguised, by Jerry Sittser; and Everything Happens for a Reason, by Kate Bowler. We also had presentations by Sara Chung, the Associate Dean of Students at Calvin, who lost her husband and father of her two children at the age of 32, and by Rev. Marc Nelesen, Ph.D., Th.M., who shared his Th.M. thesis with us and absolutely overloaded us with resources and books to seek out (my budget won't sustain it all, but I've started. Don't tell Pam!).



Our morning sessions all were so full, and so thoughtful, and so emotional, that resting afterwards was a necessity. We had some optional afternoon sessions, and some genuine retreat time, as well as two meals out all together, thanks to Calvin Seminary. The work we accomplished, the insight we gained, was far more directly vocational than I expected, even as it was intensely personal. I have already begun planning to present on the conference to our Stephen Ministers, and thinking about all the ways this conference can enrich all of our insights and practices together. The "Stephen Library" will continue to grow! Equally importantly, I recognize through hearing the lived experience of others, that I must be prepared to question, and care for, myself in order to be the best pastor possible. This group of wise folks absolutely embraces the principle of therapy for the therapist; on the notion that no-one should try to carry all the griefs the pastor receives alone.

I did not even take the chance to share the marvelous experiences of worship I experienced at both conferences; these, too, will surely make their way into what I do, and how I do it. I'll be pleased to share; but right now I suspect I've overshared. Thanks for going for the ride!

Orders of the Day:

The Annual OVPC Investment Review was conducted by Scott Derr, our Financial Investment Manager. We reviewed our investment portfolio, reports, and discussed the investment strategy going forward. We elected to keep the current allocations.

Facilities Use Committee Annual Report to Session - Judy Reich, Chair

Judy presented the Facilities Annual Report highlighting the new policy for opening and closing the buildings for single use of non-church related groups, the Annual Kitchen inspection with the Health Department was completed with no problems found, and a new Facilities Manual is being assembled. Session thanked Judy and the Facilities Committee for their dedication to OVPC and the use of our facilities.

Finance Committee - Mid-Year Finance/Budget Review - Bob Wolf, Chair

The Finance Committee's Report to Session was presented by Bob and reviewed in detail. The overall budgetary health of the church is good. Changes were made to the Operating Account where account postings were incorrect. All church accounts were reconciled and reviewed. The committee is reviewing the OVPC Finance Procedures and will present to Session for review and approval when complete. Session thanked Bob and the Finance Committee for a job well done.

MOTION passed to approve the July 2019 Financial Reports. The Deacons will be contacting the Lord Baltimore Elementary School to support student back to school needs with the local allocation of \$430.00 from the Pentecost Offering.

Nominating Committee MOTION approved to split the current Buildings and Grounds Committee into two distinct committees: Buildings Committee and Grounds Committee, each with individual chairs and a standard committee structure. 

Mission Committee Job Description Approved July 8th, 2019

The primary role of the Mission Committee, a committee of Session, is to promote, support, and focus the congregation on mission and ministry to our community and beyond. A Session Liaison will be assigned.

The Committee shall have a chair, nominated by the Church Nominating Committee, with at least 4 members at large. A liaison from both the Deacons and the Sewing Circle will be appointed by their respective groups for the purpose of information sharing, with the Deacons and the Sewing Circle responsible for their own respective mission giving and to give input to the Mission Committee.

Responsibilities:

Develop ways to assist and engage the congregation in ministry and mission locally, regionally, and globally. This may include partnering and grant writing.

Investigate and suggest new opportunities for OVPC mission involvement.

Review and update the Mission Matrix, maintained by the Church Secretary.

Serve as the point of contact with mission/ministry agencies and programs supported by the Mission Committee, including vetting those ministries annually, and finding ways the church can better partner with them in ministry.

Create and maintain a Mission Center (the well?) using it to help coordinate mission involvement within the overall ministry of the church.

Serve as a point of contact with the neighboring congregations, South East Sussex Ministerium and the Presbytery to explore potential partnerships in mission/ministry.

Promote and publicize activities to the congregation in the form of bulletin announcements, web site updates, newsletter articles and Facebook which educate the congregation on mission and ministry. Encourage financial support and "hands on" participation.

Plan and coordinate either a Mission Fair or Mission Forum every other year.

The Session supports our Congregation's continuing growth in mission involvement both in monetary support and active participation in mission. The Mission Committee will look to Session for approval on all mission activities and funding. The Committee is requesting a budget of \$ 200. this year for any expenses they may incur.

Provide a monthly committee report to Session summarizing upcoming activities.

Meet with Session on an annual basis reporting accomplishments and future activities.

Provide a Mission Committee Report for the Annual Report.
