you can see your way to that; we need you for all these things!

Frankly, there has been some conflict in our church home; this is not surprising, given the anxieties we face. We are worried about our size, about our budget, about finding enough people to do what we do, and to try new things. On top of that, we daily face the anxieties and divisions in our society, too many to name – and the conflict inherent in how we identify differently in society, yet seek to be family here. It is easy for me, or anyone, to say these anxieties should not consume us, because we are one in God. But that truth, and the peace it can and does bring, is not always evident or in the front of our minds, day to day.

Feelings are the glue that connect the mind and the body, persons, and entire systems (Hunsiger and Latini, Transforming Church Conflict, p. 166, quoting Siegel). Anxiety is a particularly strong connector in us, between us, and within groups...We may be conscious or unconscious of the anxiety that fuels our choices and behaviors... We attempt to subdue our anxiety either through aggressive speech and action, through withdrawal, or through indecision. So it is, that it is from that peace we know we can feel, because we are one in God, that we can address problems - our own and those of our neighbors, who also belong to God and therefore to us. We can, and do, focus too much on ourselves, feeding anxiety. Facing, and acting, outward will reduce anxiety, replacing it with purpose, and renewed admiration and love for one another. It is in this spirit that our Session has chosen to engage in the two year project of participating in Vital Congregations, through we will face our current situation, and seek to transform it into healthy congregational expression of love, both inward and outward. All your members of the current Session, Grace Nelson, Ellen Neumann, Ollie Robling, and myself, have committed to the program; our facilitator is long-time friend of this church and trained coach Julius Jackson, from New Castle Presbytery and Community Church. Watch for our commissioning soon! Please feel free to approach any of us with questions or issues; please don't expect us to share everything we deal with in meetings; some of that deserves privacy, as the work can get personal at many levels.

Because we - all of us! - are a small church, we need to think creatively; but even more, we need to think cohesively, and sacrificially, sometimes foregoing our preferences for the greater good and goal. We need, as Paul writes in *Philippians*, to be of one mind - and that mind, the one that is in Christ Jesus. We need to stay humble, focusing on others, loving the whole, wounded body of Christ.

Join us, friends; join us, help us, support us, pray for us. This loving

community is greater than any one of us, or any group of us, and is in fact great! Shaped by God, we love and serve. In God, we live and move and have our being. Here's to our new year, in Christ!

ORDERS OF THE DAY

Special Project - Mission -The Labyrinth - a sign will be placed next to the Labyrinth regarding the original Native American owners of that land. I will be made of gray granite, will cost \$3325 and take about 7 months to receive. There are several anonymous donors who have expressed willingness to pay for it.

Special Project - Com/Tech - see Bob Wolf's report above.

Special Project - Grounds - Paving Parking Lot - the engineer gave us another drawing and apparently there are property issues that are creating problems with moving forward.

Special Project - Campus Safety - AEDs have been installed in all buildings plus other needed safety equipment. The Task Force is now working on a Safety and Security Manual. Jake Stavinga distributed a new protocol for the Night Security Teams that check the buildings. We also asked Jake to discuss the concern about not finding interior issues (leaks, fire hazards, etc) if the security person/people do not enter the buildings. This list had 2 items that appeared to be in conflict so Jake was asked to take it back to the Task Force for revision. The Safety Task Force is also recommending placing peep holes in several doors and this was discussed in length. The conclusion was to place one in the Sanctuary side door, one in the Fellowship Center side door, one in the FC back door and one in the Memorial Hall back door by Terry's office.



Safety and Security Task Force Update

As promised, the congregation will be kept abreast of the work of this energetic body of members including Marie and Jim Waehler who lead and record our times together, Ray Keeney, Ray and Joni Keller, Jake Stavinga, Randy Bartholomew, Jen and Mike Read and Lorie and Jim Hartsig.

We have installed AEDs (automated external defibrillators) in all three buildings, one additional fire extinguisher, one new first aid kit and the other kits updated. All of these are in places where you can see them. (See photos). New, safer door latches are on order for Fellowship Center; a locksmith will install them as soon as they arrive.

Our task force is implementing a Safety and Security Manual to be placed in all buildings. Importantly, training for the use of the AED and an updated CPR session will be offered.

Our Sunday security teams have greeted and welcomed late arrivers to our worship services who have expressed gratitude in being given entry, bulletins and help with seating.

We continue meeting monthly to complete our list of tasks to provide a safer and more secure environment for the OVPC campus, our members and our visitors.

OVPC Has Joined The Vital Congregations' Initiative So What?

We have heard it before - right? Church leadership has voted to join with our brothers and sisters in other churches in the denomination to do something new - or do something we have always done in new ways. We have already identified Ocean View as a Matthew 25 church and one focus of this is to 'build congregational vitality' - so what is so different about this?


We all recognize that church isn't what it used to be - the pews aren't as full, the finances are a struggle, volunteerism is down - and yet we continue to do wonderful things for each other and for the stranger - so let's start looking at what our church can be. This initiative is nationwide because we are not alone - and there is a vision that we can renew our churches and ourselves by engaging in a time of assessment and evaluation of our church. So we are working towards not just a vital congregation but a *revitalized* congregation.

OVPC leadership did not enter this initiative lightly; it is recognized that there are conflicts in our church and some folks that are just plain not very happy, and we want more than anything to heal the wounds, lessen the anxiety and bring a sense of joy back to our congregation. Each team member entered into a signed covenant agreement with the Presbytery to commit for a minimum of 2 years and honestly it is a bit of a scary proposition. The team will be looking at OVPC'S past - both recent and distant, what is happening now and looking toward our future. We know that this will require having difficult discussions that will necessitate us all to put our ego aside, lower our defenses, and be willing to let go of some things we may hold dear or accept some truths that we really don't want to face.

This work won't be done in a vacuum - after all, it is being done in large part for you, the congregation, and you will be asked for your input at various times throughout the process in fact, your comments are always welcome. It is preferred that your comments be in writing (email is fine) and can be sent to the entire team and will remain confidential. While some of the conversations that will take place cannot be shared and must remain private, the team will provide regular updates in the newsletter and from the pulpit when appropriate.

Your team consists of Sue Baer, Bev Bailey, Ray Keeney, Grace Nelson, Ellen Neumann, Marlene Quinn, Ollie Robling, Jake Stavinga, Bob Wolf, Pastor Terry and our facilitator representing New Castle Presbytery is Julius Jackson. If you have any questions, please feel free to reach out. We are just getting started with only 2 meetings under our belts and are excited about the possibilities that lie ahead!

As Rich served 24 years in the US Army, they moved often and lived in every part of the United States, in addition to spending six tours overseas. Rich was a Colonel when he retired from the Army and he then worked 15 years for the State Department, doing overseas construction. He worked in 62 countries during his two careers.

Their son Christopher and grandchildren Ryann and Bo live in Northern Virginia, which was where Rich and Lene lived, prior to coming to Delaware.

They were both raised Lutheran, became Methodist after moving to Ocean View and they are now thankful to be Presbyterian and happy to be part of the kind and loving OVPC family.





55 Families Receive New Stoves

The kitchen is the heart of the home. It is a place where families gather to prepare a meal and share stories of their day. But for many rural Guatemalans, the kitchen is also a room filled with smoke, unsafe conditions, and piles of expensive firewood. To address this, the Association launched a <u>fuel-efficient stove project</u> several years ago which continues to be extremely popular today.

Just last week, our manufacturing partners of <u>AJPU</u> delivered 30 stoves to women of the <u>Association</u> and will be delivering a second order of 25 to another community next month. Funds for the first 30 stoves came from a family at <u>Trinity Presbyterian Church</u> (Wilmington, DE) who made a generous donation in memory of their son. The second batch of 25 stoves has been funded by our other in-country partner, <u>CEDEPCA</u>. Thanks to these gifts, 55 families will now be able to cook their daily meals on new stoves that use less wood, save money, vent smoke outside, and provide heat for the home. This project also provides employment for five people and supports the local economy.

Each stove costs \$250. The recipient family must invest \$50 of their own money toward this cost (with donors covering the remaining \$200). Because they spend so much less on firewood, women recoup their \$50 investment in just five months. To date, nearly 500 stoves have been delivered to Association members and there continues to be a waiting list of women who have saved up their share of the cost and are waiting for a stove.
